LARRY WEISE St. Bonaventure University

Tournament Director



Larry Weise is a special leader associated with the Eastern College Athletic Conference and intercollegiate basketball. Director of Athletics at St. Bonaventure University, his alma mater, he is a former Brown Indian co-captain, who played in two N.I.T. Tournaments. A native of East Rochester, he was an outstanding defensive performer and led Bona in scoring as a junior. He was graduated in 1958 in physics with honors.

The highlight of his 12-year coaching career came during the 1969-70 season when his Bonnies reached the NCAA Championships. SBU defeated Davidson 85-72 in first round action and then won over North Carolina State 80-68 and Villanova 97-74 to earn the East Regional Championship. In the NCAA Nationals his team lost to Jacksonville and New Mexico State, concluding the season 25-3, best in Bona annals.

Weise's 1967-68 team won 23 straight games, another SBU record. During his coaching career Bona won 202 and lost 90. His 1969-70 club was 22-1. He never experienced a losing campaign and guided the Brown to tournament triumphs in 1961 at the Blue Grass, 1967 at Tampa Invitational, 1970 at the ECAC Holiday Festival (MSG), 1970 at the Gator Bowl, plus a third place finish in the 1971 N.I.T. In 1968 he was named "Eastern Coach of the Year" and received the Schoenfeld Sportsmanship Award.

His eighth annual Basketball Clinic will be held on the Bona campus this summer. Past clinics have featured his prize pupil, NBA super star Bob Lanier of the NBA Detroit Pistons.

AD Weise is also a member of the 1975 ECAC Basketball Selection Committee with Ronald Perry of Holy Cross, Leland Byrd of West Virginia, James McDermott of Iona and Wilbur Renkin of Albright, chairman. Members of the ECAC Division One Post-Season Basketball Tournament Committee were selected by the ECAC President and Commissioner.

Administrative assistance is provided the Committee by Commissioner Scotty Whitelaw, Assistants to the Commissioner Arthur Hyland, Richard Hussey and Basketball Administrator Harry Arlanson.

ECAC BASKETBALL . . . Orangemen,

Bonnies, Stags and Purple Eagles

Welcome to this first annual Eastern College Athletic Conference Upstate New York Basketball Tournament.

There are three other ECAC regional tournaments going on in different locales in the East. The Southern Tournament also begins tonight in the West Virginia University Coliseum. The New England regional, hosted in the Springfield Civic Center, and the Metropolitan New York-New Jersey regional, held in Madison Square Garden, both began yesterday.

Sixteen teams have been selected to compete in these four tournaments, with the four winners advancing to first-round play in the National Collegiate Athletic Assn. Tournament.

All teams involved are Division One Independents.

The formation of the regional tournaments—for which 37 teams were eligible—eliminates the former procedure of selecting "at large" teams to compete in the NCAA Tournament.

Athletic directors from five ECAC member institutions met in a conference call last Sunday to select most of the tournment field. Other choices were picked Monday. The selection committee consisted of St. Bonaventure's Larry Weise, Albright College's Wilbur Renken, Ron Perry of Holy Cross, Jimmy McDermott of Iona and Lee Byrd of West Virginia.

Each athletic director cast an advisory ballot, in which the top five teams were ranked on a one-to-five basis. The athletic directors, however, were not allowed to vote for their own team. Overall record, and schedule strength were the criteria for the ranking. Of course, the ADs were only allowed to vote within their regions.

Syracuse, St. Bonaventure, Fairfield and Niagara were the choices to compete in this Upstate event.

Canisius, because it had used two ineligible players — Larry Fogle and Charley Jordan — for much of the season, felt it was necessary to withdraw from consideration. The two were declared ineligible last Friday after the school found conclusive evidence that they had received "improper financial aid."

The Saltine Warriors from Syracuse enter post-season play for the fifth consecutive year, and hope to make the NCAA event for the third straight season. Coach Roy Danforth's Orangemen went to the NIT in 1971 and '72.

Syracuse defeated both Niagara and St. Bonaventure during the regular season and compiled an 18-7 record, the best in the region

The Orangemen's main threats are co-captains Rudy Hackett and Mike Lee.

Hackett, an agile 6-9, averaged 22 points and 13 rebounds through the regular season. He is an excellent All-American candidate who hit better than 56 per cent from the floor this season. The 21-year-old Mt. Vernon native toured Italy last July with the U.S. AAU team and was the leading rebounder in six games.

Lee is a deadly free throw shooter and made half of his field goal attempts this past season. He runs the Syracuse offense. The Kirkwood native is generally regarded as one of the top guards in the East. He averaged 15 points during the regular season.

Chris Sease, 6-4, and Earnie Seibert, 6-9, join Hackett on the front line. (continued on page 14)

EASTERN COLLEGE ATHLETIC CONFERENCE

"Don't forget the mimeograph machine in the bathtub of Room 315 at the Roosevelt." This remark, which seems to refer to a collegiate prank of some sort, in reality is made by officials of the Eastern College Athletic Conference to anyone writing about the organization's history. More than anything else, it epitomizes the situation existing at the birth of this unique athletic conference — the nation's largest with

Back on January 3, 1938, what is now the ECAC started as the Central Office for Eastern Intercollegiate Athletics with its new Executive Director, Asa Bushnell, a secretary, a two-room suite in the Hotel Biltmore (in what had originally been the hotel's library), a \$28,000 yearly budget, and the mimeograph in the bathtub.

Now the ECAC occupies a stately home situated on six and a half acres overlooking Nantucket Sound in Centerville, Massachusetts, employs the full-time services of four executives and eight clerical assistants and grosses more than its original budget in one day at some of the major tournaments that it sponsors.

In 1937, the ECAC was set up as a kind of a holding company for athletic organizations. At the time, a number of eastern intercollegiate leagues and associations were going their own ways, duplicating efforts and money in the separate management of their affairs. The obvious solution was attained when several athletic administrators reached the conclusion that one central office, performing the administrative functions that had been handled previously by separate units, would be a wise alternative.

Asa Bushnell, then graduate manager of athletics at Princeton, was tapped for the job by a selection committee chaired by Cornell's Jim Lynah. Fourteen leagues and affiliations formed the basis of the ECAC in those early years. One of Bushnell's first tasks was to set up a scheduling convention, a two-day affair attended by some four dozen athletic directors, to assist them in ironing out intercollegiate schedules in all sports. Now, 36 years later, the schedule-making get-together is still one of the highlights of the annual ECAC September meetings.

Next, Bushnell accepted the responsibility for assigning football officials to the games of the member colleges. Assignment of officials is to this day one of the ECAC's most important functions. Today, in addition to the appointment of game officials in football, the conference supervises similar appointments in basketball, baseball, gymnastics, hockey, fencing, soccer, swimming, track and wrestling. In a given calendar year, the ECAC will arrange more than 13,000 individual officiating assignments. In addition to the assignments, the conference also is responsible for the rating and ranking of officials, as well as the continued development of new officials.

The really big change in the ECAC's way of life came shortly after World War II. It was in 1947 that the name was changed to its present one and the concept altered. From an association of associations, a conference of conferences, the ECAC became an association of individual colleges. The leagues and associations which had been the impetus for the founding of the conference, continued in affiliate membership.

The shift had much to do with the needs of the times. The need earlier had been to bring order out of chaos in the league set-up in the East. At that time in 1947, the need was to bring eligibility standards and stability to the number of colleges participating in athletics in the area.

While recognizing the right of each college to regulate its own athletic affairs, set its own standards of eligibility, and operate under its own ethics, the ECAC established certain minimum standards regarding scholastic standing, transfers, years of participation, financial aid, amateurism, and other allied concerns. This, briefly, is the "why" behind the formation of the ECAC.



What else does the ECAC do? In addition to the assignment, rating, and training of officials in ten sports, the Conference spends a good deal of time in the organization and running of tournaments and title meets. Among the major events conducted by the ECAC are the Holiday Basketball Festival in Madison Square Garden, the new ECAC Ocean State Holiday Basketball Tournament in Providence's Civic Center, the I.C.A.A.A.A. and Heptagonal track championships — indoor, outdoor, cross country — and two major rowing championships: The I.R.A. Regatta at Syracuse and the Eastern Association of Rowing Colleges Sprint Championships which this year will be held in Princeton, N.J. Also, the conference conducts ECAC championships in hockey, golf, and tennis, as well as providing management for eastern fencing, gymnastics and wrestling championships. The ECAC also serves in a coordinating capacity for the National Invitation Tournament. Regional ECAC championships are conducted

in baseball, basketball, soccer, and lacrosse for the Division II and III institutions in the conference.

This year an important post-season basketball tournament for Division I independents will take place the first week in March at four regional locations, with the winners of each ECAC Regional automatically advancing to the first round of the NCAA tournament. Madison Square Garden will be the site for the Metropolitan New York-New Jersey Regional; the Buffalo Memorial Auditorium for the Upstate New York Regional; the Springfield Civic Center for the New England Regional; and the 14,000-seat WVU Coliseum on the campus of West Vurginia University for the Southern Regional.

Another large block of time is spent in the administration of the conference's eligibility regulations; dealing with other conferences and the National Collegiate Athletic Association; and educational and public relations functions. The ECAC maintains a Service Bureau which selects weekly and seasonal All-Conference teams in football, basketball and hockey, as well as publishing programs for the various championships, and press, radio, and television guides in basketball, football and hockey.



Who belongs to the ECAC? Two hundred and ten large and small colleges and universities, private, state and municipal institutions make-up the United States' largest athletic conference. The conference territory embraces 12 New England and Middle Atlantic States, as well as Maryland, Virginia and the District of Columbia. All Eastern College Athletic Conference members are four-year institutions and are accredited by the regional accrediting agencies (the Middle States Association of Colleges and the New England Association of Colleges) having direct jurisdiction over the areas in which the institutions are located. Such accreditation is a prerequisite for an applicant college's election to membership.

The ECAC is an allied member of the NCAA, and practically all of its members hold individual membership in the NCAA and are active in the affairs of that organization. The ECAC Commissioner, Robert M. "Scotty" Whitelaw, is a member of the Collegiate Commissioners Association, and through this latter body keeps in close touch with the activities of the ten other major sport conferences throughout the nation.


Because of its diversity, size, and the fact that it is not a "playing conference", the ECAC is unique among all of the conferences in the country. It is because of this distinction that the ECAC is one of the strongest forces in intercollegiate athletics.







Jimmy Williams, who played at East High in Buffalo, starts in the backcourt with Lee. The 5-10 sophomore is cat quick and especially dangerous on the break.

In seven years as head coach, Danforth has had only one losing campaign. He was 9-16 in his first season at Syracuse.

St. Bonaventure has plenty of offensive firepower. The Bonnies' front line of Bob Rozyczko, 6-7; Greg Sanders, 6-6; and Essie Hollis, 6-6, can fill the bucket, and all will be back next season.

Rozyczko, a Syracuse native who almost transferred to SU after his sophomore season, is the Indians' top scorer (19.5), and also their leading rebounder. He is a junior. Sanders, a freshman, has been a pleasant surprise. The Washington, D.C., southpaw became a starter in the University of Maryland Invitational at Christmastime and has been there ever since. He has a 17.5 average. Hollis, a sophomore, is at

Jerry Beckles and Jim Baron, both sophomores, are the guards, with exciting freshman Glenn Hagan, subbing for either.

Bona had a horrendous road record, winning only one of

nine games away this past season.

The team from Allegany also earned the Little Three championship, in competition with both Canisius and Niagara.

Bona had a 13-12 mark.

Fairfield rallied late in the season to come into consideration. Coach Fred Barakat's Stags were 5-9 earlier in the season,

and won eight of their 11 games. Big late-season wins came over the University of Massachusetts and Canisius.

Barakat, a former star at Assumption College, a Division II perennial power, guided his team to the NIT last season after compiling a regular-season mark of 17-9.

Fairfield's front line consists of consistent senior Ralph Rehn, 6-7; sophomore Owen Mahorn, 6-5; and 6-9 freshman Steve Balkun. The latter is already being touted as the best big man to ever play at Fairfield.

The guards are 6-3 senior captain Ray Kelly, who averaged in double figures in his last three seasons, and 6-3 junior Danny Odums. Odums transferred from Austin Peay. The Brooklyn native, who despite playing only two seasons at AP, became the university's all-time career assist record-holder.

Niagara, 12-13, has one of the tournament's most exciting players in 6-3 Andy Walker. The junior topped the Purple Eagles in scoring (20.7), and despite playing primarily in the backcourt, was Niagara's top rebounder with an average of

This, too, is a youthful team with no senior starters. Bruce Watson, a 6-9 junior, is the center, and is flanked by freshmen Vern Allen, 6-9, and Ollie Harper, 6-5. The three combined for an average of almost 34 points.

Chico Singelton or Bob Sinicola will start alongside Walker, with Roy Beekman (10.1) coming off the bench.

The winner of this weekend's Upstate Tournament advances to the opening round of the NCAA Tournament and will play in either Philadelphia or Charlotte.
