### Weise To Bonnies: Play Like You Have Five Calvin Murphys

Can you imagine playing five Calvin Murphys?

One of them, you'd have to say, is enough for any basketball team to handle. Five Calvins would seem to be the impossible, but — But, that's how unbeaten St. Bonaventure played and destroyed Niagara Saturday night.

Lanier, a prime candidate for All-American honors, took care of the 6-8 Manny Leaks in this fashion: Leaks had 12 points and 13 rebounds. But he didn't get a shot off until 11:50 was left in the first half and didn't score a field goal until 6:22 was left in the half.

COACH LARRY WEISE'S orders to his ninth ranked Brown Indians were simple: "Play everyone as if they had five Calvin Murphys."  
The Bonnies responded with a magnificent defensive performance enroute to an easy 101-72 win over Niagara. The Purple Eagles simply couldn't cope with the tight 1-2-2 defense that handcuffed Calvin. The 5-10 sophomore scoring whiz, — the nation's No. 2 scorer — netted but 25 points, 17 below his average and his lowest output this season. It could have been worse had not the Bonnies showed compassion in the final three minutes.

THE BONNIES' 11TH win without a loss was easy. The offensive power was supplied by Bill Butler with 30 points, Bob Lanier with 26 points and John Hayes with 19 points.  
And, what an awesome trio! It was, however, the defense that made the Eagles look bad and frustrated Calvin, who moved all over the court trying to find room to shoot. He couldn't find that room. Wherever he went, that 1-2-2 zone covered him. He was limited to 24 shots. Weise, discussing the Bonnies' defense, pointed out:

"We played it straight. The only thing I told the players was to play everyone as if they had five Calvin Murphys. They were on Murphy wherever he went. That's what we tried to do. He went everywhere too. He even went into the high post."

### 5,994 View No. 11, Cal 'Held' To 25

(Jan. 6, University Center)  
Can you imagine playing five Calvin Murphys? One of them, you'd have to say, is enough for any basketball team to handle. Five Calvins would seem to be the impossible, but — But, that's how unbeaten St. Bonaventure played and destroyed Niagara Saturday night before 5,994 fans — largest crowd ever to see a basketball game in the University Center.

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THE BONNIE, coach, analyzing his club's defense: "They had their hands up to make it tough. Billy (Kalbaugh) played the point (on the zone) well. He would lay back at the right time or go for the steal at the right time."  
Kalbaugh came up with several steals. The combination of Kalbaugh and Butler or Kalbaugh and Jimmy Satalin pinched Murphy off at the sideline, forcing bad passes, jump balls, or coming away with clean steals and easy fast break layup baskets.

Weise was asked if he had changed his normal 1-2-2 defense. "No, we played it straight. It's what we do best. We went over our zone. It's natural when you play a tremendous player like Murphy, you are liable to sag off on the other four. We were right on top of everyone. I never considered using anything else," he added.

Niagara tried to zone (2-3) the Bonnies. But Eagles coach Jim Maloney junked that defense when Bona sprinted to a 20-10 lead with 12:12 left in the first half.

"It hurt us, making the switch to man-for-man," noted Maloney. "We weren't scoring and we had to make the game tempo faster for us."  
In making this move, Maloney inserted three guards into the lineup. With Murphy, he used Mike Brown and Al Schug. This was a fatal move, however. For almost nine minutes, the 5-10 Brown got caught on defense trying to guard the 6-5
