your letter of the  
14<sup>th</sup> I gladly received last night while

I have had from any one of you

you surely would write would you

it, if you dont write oftener to your  
Duchman than you do to me I dont think  
you care much for him, you are looking  
for one to come home see you?  
There is no need of that, you will look  
in vain if you do. I dont believe they  
will let the Nets go home every seven.  
Old Stanton says the Nets must

stay and let the Sols and Boe  
guys run go here first then  
if "Cishey Smith" dont see him to  
had he will let the Vets go may be  
if he gets drunk and gets a clean  
fit on, and if not he will keep them,  
We dont know what will be done

We have got a splendid camp here  
our whole "Brigade" lays here. But  
I dont think we shall stay here long  
the 23<sup>rd</sup> & 24<sup>th</sup> that "Grand review" is to  
come off and we must March and  
conquer march around and through  
Washington to glorify the memory  
of some larry "Big Bugs" that is to  
say to come here and see us,  
it looks splendid for folks to sit in  
stamps and windows and see soldiers  
march by. But not so easy for the  
soldiers. It looks to them

as the Old Indian said (the earliest  
thing in ones damn mind to see a white  
man March. I am talking with Ed.

Meris and Santhwick our home guy  
old times Ed. is Orchely Dan is Carp  
and is General as I call him and I  
am a high front in the rear rank

They are going to oust out all men  
that times Expire before the first of  
October and I shouldnt wonder if the  
celebration never to break up the  
Regt. and send the Vets into  
"Handcuffs" Victorian Corps. we dont  
know what will be done with us yet

if you see my wife you can tell  
her you have heard from me and  
I am well and would like to see  
her very much. Have quite write  
as soon as you can and tell me all
