### Pat Jones.

Pat Jones was well known here as  
a dashing and capable soldier, trusted  
by his superiors and respected by his  
men. His recent death in New York  
called forth the following from the  
pen of Mr. J. C. Stafford, late of  
Company H, 37th N. Y. Vol. infan-  
try, writing from Buffalo to the Jamestown  
Journal has this to say of the  
late Patrick Jones. "Mr. Jones en-  
listed in what we then called Co. I,  
64th N. Y. militia, organized at Alle-  
gany, Cattaraugus county. On the  
15th of May we elected officers as fol-  
lows: E. G. Harmon, captain; John  
R. McConnell, first lieutenant; Pat-  
rick Jones, second lieutenant and By-  
Johnson, orderly sergeant. We went  
to New York city and joined the 38th  
N. Y. Irish Rifles and were known  
for two years as Co. H. During the  
peninsular campaign, I think just after  
the battle of Fair Oaks, Pat. Jones  
was promoted to adjutant of his regi-  
ment; later the seven day's fight he  
was promoted to major and aide camp  
on General Kearney's staff and held  
this position when General Kearney  
was killed Sept. 1, 1862, at Chantilly.  
Soon after he came to New York and  
went into the 154th New York Vols.,  
and was soon after made colonel and  
general. In the spring of '63 he was  
wounded at the battle of Chancellors-  
ville. He participated in all the  
battles of the army of the Potomac  
from first Bull Run to Chantilly and  
with our company and division until  
Sept. 1, 1862. In the account given  
in Friday's Journal, it does not give  
him credit for some of the hardest  
fought battles of the war. We con-  
sider "Pat" Jones, as we always call-  
ed him, as good a soldier as was ever  
made and they made some good ones."
