The interest on the debt for the year will be \$10,000,000, while the amount in gold for the current year, or any year, has been so far at the rate of over \$100,000,000.  
It is seen that even the present gold revenues are largely in excess of the wants of the Government for the payment of gold interest, which increase of the tariff will doubtless raise the receipts from customs for the same amount to \$150,000,000 per annum.
