IN MEMORIAN.

Another Old Landmark Gone.

Truman D. Blowers was born in Oneida County, N. Y. August 30, 1836, and died at the home of his daughter in Salamanca, February, 27 1920, having reached the advanced age of 83 years 5 months and 27 days.

He was one of a family of six children, two sons and four daughters, his parents being Truman and Sarah Chapman Blowers, all of whom are now gone with the exception of one sister, Mrs. Eunice Turner, whose home is in Chilla, Wisconsin.

On January 1, 1860, he was united in marriage to Miss Eliza D. Parker, and to this union were born four children, three daughters, Mrs. Gertrude Steffenhagen and Mrs. Emma Steffenhagen of West Valley and Mrs. Anna Stevens of Salamanca, N. Y. and one son Edward who died in infancy. Mr. Blowers with his family came to West Valley, 41 years ago, and entered into the Mercantile business, and for 27 years, did a prosperous business, always upright and honest in all his dealings, he won the confidence and highest esteem of all. After years of successful business career and feeling the approach of old age, he retired from active service, and with his life's companion, made for themselves a comfortable home wherein to spend their declining years. On August 19, 1912 his wife was called to try the realities of death, and for the most of the time since, he has lived alone, but so near the homes of his daughters that they were able to look after his interests, and care for his wants.
