WILLIAM BUCK,

son of William A. and Lois L. Sly Buck, was born Nov. 8, 1840 at Bath, N. H., and came with his parents to this county in 1843. Aug. 1, 1862 he enlisted at Randolph, N. Y., in Co. A, 154th N. Y. V. I., 1st Brig., 1st Div., 11th A. C., as a private. He was with his regiment at Chancellorsville, Lookout Valley, Mission Ridge, Rocky Face Ridge, Reseca, Pumpkinvine Creek, New Hope Church, Dallas, Kenaw Mt., Peach Tree Creek, Siege of Atlanta, March to the Sea, Campaign in the Carolinas, ending with Johnston's surrender. May 1863 he was captured at Chancellorsville by Jackson, and taken to Libby prison, where he remained 4 days and was then paroled at City Point. They had been surrounded by 500 men, and 50 were captured. Aug., 1863 he was given a 10 day furlough and returned to his command at Bridgeport, Ala. in Oct. Out of one thousand in his regiment only 300 came back at close of war, and of our Comrade's six companions only he was unharmed. Com. Buck was among the soldiers who captured the bank at Waynesboro. He was given his well-earned discharge in June, 1865. Feb 29, 1868, at Steamburg, N. Y. was married to Sarah A., daughter of Francis and Anna Coal Bryant of Bristol, England. She was born Oct. 5, 1851, in Bristol, coming with her parents to America. Two children were born to them, Lula, born July 29, 1870, and Jessie J., born May 3, 1872. His grandfather, Amassy Buck, was a hero of the Revolution and died at Randolph, Dec. 24, 1880. His brother Alfred was in Co. B, 64th N. Y. V. I., and died at Elmira with the measles before starting to front. Brother Samuel Bryant, in Co. H, 154th N. Y. V. I., now living at Cherry Creek, N. Y. Her brother Isaac, in same company, died at Chancellorsville, and brother William Bryant was also in the vice. Comrade Buck is O. of D. in D. T. Wiggins post, and is a respected mechanic of E. Randolph, N. Y.

HENRY BUCKLEY

born in Bolivar, N. Y. May 20, 1834, a son of Ashel and Maryley Buckley, and Dec. 6, 1859, in the town of his nativity, he was happily united in marriage to Mary E. Jordon, daughter of John W. Joanna Swartout Jordon. Two children have graced their home,

Bert D. D. and Stella J. Com. Buckley was engaged as a farmer when the flag was trailed in the dust of the South; he enlisted in Aug. 1861, in the regimental band of the 28th N. Y. V. I., as musician playing on the B. B. flat cornet. He was present at battles of Winchester, 2d Bull Run, and Cedar Mt. The last named fight they lost nearly all their men, 65 reporting for duty before battle of Antietam. When the order came to disband the regimental bands, he was discharged, Dec. 2, 1862, at Rockville, Md. Again, in Sept., 1864, at Bolivar, N. Y., he enlisted in the brigade band of Harding's Div., 22d Corps. This was stationed at Ft. Reno, where he remained until finally discharged, June 30, 1865 at Washington. Brother G. A. Buckley was bridge builder pontioneer, worked for the government by the month, and was with Sherman to the Sea; brother E. G. Buckley was in 85th in the service. His grandfather Rolley was a captain in Revolutionary War. Mrs. Buckley's brother, Delizan Gordon, was a member of 85th and 23d N. Y. as Lieut., resigned and re-enlisted as a private. Her father was colonel in state militia, raised a company at outbreak of the war, and, being too old, resigned. Com. Buckley is a member of the Fuller post, and lives on a well-kept farm in West Salamanca, N. Y.

JULIUS BURLINGAME,

A native of Franklinville, N. Y., was born July 4, 1833, a son of Philip and Sally Dodge Burlingame, both of whom have passed away Nov. 1, 1856, at Friendship, N. Y., he was married to Louisa A. Peck daughter of George and Sarah J. Dumond Peck. She was born Nov. 9, 1849, at Hinsdale. Four children were born to them, Berdell J. B. Fred C., Ina A. (Phelps) and Elmer E. Bidding his young wife and children good-bye, he shouldered his musket, enlisting March 15, 1865 at Hinsdale, N. Y., in Co. K, 65th N. Y. V. I. Joining this regiment at Burkes Sta., he shared its glories to the end of the war. Many are the hard marches on the Danville R. R. after Johnston's army, and the hard skirmishes. One night our comrade slept in a corn-field between the rows; it rained, but as he says, "I never slept better in my life." His record is a clean one and worthy of preservation. He was discharged July 17, 1865, at Hall's Hill, Va. His brothers Herbert and Eugene were martyrs to the cause; the former died at Washington, and the latter was wounded at the Wilderness and died July 4, 1864. Mrs. Burlingame's brother, Malan C. Peck, was a member of 85th N. Y. V. I. Com. Burlingame has been honored by public office of J. of P., two terms, assessor, 9 years and school trustee; is member of A. O. U. W., G. A. R.; both are members of Grange and 1st Baptist church. He is an esteemed citizen of Hinsdale, N. Y.
