Obituaries

Mrs. Addie M. Burdick

Following an illness of several months duration Mrs. Addie M. Burdick passed away Wednesday morning, June 1, 1938. Funeral services held from the home of her daughter, Mrs. Roy Caverly, Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock, were largely attended. Rev. R. E. Niemann, pastor of the Walnut Street M. E. church officiated. Burial was in Lakeview cemetery.

Addie M. Davis was born January 1st, 1859, at Little Falls, New York, the only daughter of Oney Davis and Sarah Ann Sturtevant, who with three brothers, and three granddaughters have preceded her in death. At the age of eleven years Mrs. Burdick moved to Howell with her parents, coming to Buffalo by train, through the Welland canal by towboat, by boat to Detroit, and stage coach to Howell. As a girl she remembered the funeral train of President Lincoln passing through Little Falls.

Her parents purchased the block on which the Schnackenberg Funeral home now stands. The house was sold to the Hatton's and the family moved into a new home in the same block which was later torn down.

Mrs. Burdick's parents were staunch Presbyterians, her father being a student and teacher of the Bible. His library consisted of Bible commentaries and other religious volumes; therefore it was only natural that she should teach a class of boys in the Howell Presbyterian church.

Following her marriage to Perry Gardner Burdick in Detroit April 13, 1887, she joined the Walnut Street Methodist Episcopal church. Mr. Burdick passed away at Howell October 10, 1906. She was an active member of the church for 45 years and also of Class Five until failing health kept her at home. She was also a member of the Maccahees.

Mrs. Burdick was a good neighbor and industrious to the end. She loved flowers, reading, her home and children and her own home was the meeting place for the youngsters of the neighborhood. During the last 23 years of her life she made her home with her daughter.

The deceased is survived by two children: William Henry Burdick and Mrs. Roy Caverly, and one grandchild, Billy Caverly, all of Howell.
