DIED IN HOWELL JUNE 22, 1920
 FOLLOWING A BRIEF
 23 June 1920 ILLNESS

Louis Adams Kirk was the eldest child of the late Arlington and Frances M. Adams Kirk. He was born January 2nd, 1878, in Oceola, and died June 22, 1920, at his home in Howell, W. Sibley St., aged nearly forty-two and one-half years.

When he was 4 years old, June 1, 1882, their happy home in the village of Hartland was shattered by the death of his mother. Surviving her were her husband, this little son and an infant daughter.

For the next five years and more, he was well and kindly cared for at the home of his uncle, Albert Kirk, in Fenton. Upon the marriage of his father in 1887, to Miss Burdick, of Howell, he and his sister, Frances M., came back to the restored home. Frances died when nearly ten years of age. Later the village home was sold and the old homestead purchased, where he lived until he had a home of his own. He took a business course at Fenton and later was employed with an electrical company in Chicago.

August 12, 1902 he was married to Belle Phipps, of Oceola, whose home was with her grandmother, Ellen Armstrong, who died three months previous. Later they owned a part of the G. B. Armstrong homestead, where they remained until nearly two years ago, when they sold this and purchased their present home.

He was an honorable and upright gentleman in all his dealings. At the time of his death he held a responsible position in the employ of Spencer-Smith Machine Company, of this city.

He is survived by his loyal wife, three daughters, Frances Louise, Alice Pauline and Beatrice Ella, and besides their mother, 2 sisters, Mrs. Fred Preston, of Hartland; Mrs. C. Rayl of Wilmore, Ky.; and one brother, A. Burdick Kirk, on the old home.
