

Civil War Veterans Come To His Burial

WARRIORS WITH SHERMAN

Part in the Famous March... Attends To the Burial—Prior To His Participation in the Battle of Lookout Mountain and Mission Ridge—After the War He Served a Term in the New York State Legislature.

Winfield S. Cameron died at his home, 23 Fairmount avenue, this morning at 9 o'clock in his 90th year. He was born June 5, 1828, near Meadville, Pa. He is survived by a son, Winfield H. Cameron of this city and a daughter, Mrs. Jane Mead of Ripley.

When a young man Major Cameron attended Randolph academy and at the outbreak of the war was engaged in the lumber business at Randolph. At that time the government offered inducements in the form of commissions to the army to those recruiting a certain number of men for army service. Cameron succeeded in securing a company number of enlistments. A physical examination at the recruiting office, so Mr. Cameron joined the army as a private in the 154th regiment of infantry later known as the Army of the Potomac. This regiment was encamped on South Mountain in this city near what is now known as Lincoln park bordering on the southern limit of Jamestown before leaving for the front. Mr. Cameron steadily rose in the ranks holding the rank of lieutenant colonel at the close of the war.

Major Cameron as he has been known to his friends was wounded in battle and captured by the enemy at Missionville, but recovered from his wounds and was exchanged, rejoining his regiment in time to participate in the battle of Lookout Mountain and Mission Ridge. Following the battle of Mission Ridge his regiment was attached to Sherman's army and consequently he participated in the march to Atlanta and the sea. At this time he held the rank of captain and was acting inspector general of the division. He received his title of major during the march to the sea, and was brevetted lieutenant colonel shortly before the grand review in Washington in which he participated. Following the grand review he was offered a commission in the regular army, but decided to return to civil life, coming to this city where he engaged in the practice of law after pursuing a course of study at Albany Law school. Just 25 years ago he was elected a member of the New York state assembly.

At the time of his death Major Cameron was the oldest practicing attorney of the Jamestown bar. During his career he served as a member of assembly from the first assembly district of Chautauque county. He was a member of the Local Union, a national organization composed of commissioning officers who served in the army. He was also a member of the G. A. R. and served as a member of the National Chautauque Association for many years.

The funeral will be held from the home, Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock.
