THE 49TH.—The following list of casualties in Companies from this County, in the fight near Fort Stevens, Washington, we find in the *Buffalo Express*:

Co. A—1st Lieut. David Lambert, killed—bullet through head; private Charles Layton, killed; Sergt. Marion Hull, wounded—since dead.

Co. G—Sergeant Nehemiah Sperry, wounded slightly in shoulder.

Co. I—Privates Frank Stafford and Frank Braggeman.

Lieut. Col. Geo. Johnson, of Buffalo, who was mortally wounded in the fight, has since died.
