CAPT JOHN Q. GATSWOLD - Capt  
John Q. Gatswold, of the 154th Reg., who  
was wounded at the battle of Chancellors-  
ville, and taken prisoner by the rebels, is at  
his home in Ankrwright on a visit. He was  
wounded by the passage of a Minnie ball  
through the right arm above the elbow.  
The bone is not injured, and he is likely to  
recover the use of the limb. He was in the  
hands of the rebels about three weeks before  
he was exchanged. He was fortunate in the  
matter of exchange, as the boatload in which  
he came down was the last which the rebels  
have allowed to leave Richmond. His arm  
was becoming very bad under the neglect of  
the prison treatment, and he thinks he could  
not have survived imprisonment till the pres-  
ent time. Capt. G. thinks that a greater  
effect by the rebels in the Army of the Po-  
tomac than the defeats they have experienced  
is the Copperhead manifestations among the  
people at the North. He also confirms the  
impression that it is the hope kept alive by  
these manifestations which principally sus-  
tains the rebels in a content so discouraging  
in its other aspects to their cause. The great  
burden of conversation with them, both offi-  
cers and men, appeared to be the approach-  
ing depletion of our army through the expi-  
ration of the terms of the various regiments,  
which they regarded as nearly equivalent to  
its dissolution. To the suggestion  
that a draft was to take place, they replied  
that our Government would not dare to draft
