TRUMAN H. HINMAN

Civil War Veteran Who Marched With Sherman from Atlanta to the Sea Dies at Home at East Randolph.

RANDOLPH, Feb. 12. — Truman H. Hinman, 87, Civil War veteran and retired farmer, died early Sunday morning [February 11] at his home in East Randolph, where he had resided for 13 years, going there from East Otto, where he was born November 22, 1846. He is survived by two sons, Charles F. Hinman of Victor, Mont., and Burt H. Hinman of East Randolph; one sister, Mrs. Allie Fleming of Medicine Hat, Alta.; one stepson, George Dunn of Randolph; one stepdaughter, Mrs. T. K. H. Robinson, of Savannah; 10 grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

Mr. Hinman enlisted in the 154th New York Volunteer Infantry, Sept. 9, 1864, and was with general Sherman's army during the famous march to the sea, being honorably discharged June 21, 1865.

Mr. Hinman was the last surviving member of the former A. A. Hall post, No. 666, G.A.R., of East Randolph, which about 20 years ago was consolidated with D. T. Wiggins post of Randolph. With Mr. Hinman's death, James Kelly becomes the sole surviving member of the latter post.

Mr. Hinman was a member of Conewango lodge, I.O.O.F. of East Randolph, and of the East Randolph M.E. church.

Funeral services will be held Tuesday at 2 p.m. at the church, where the body will lie in state from 12 o'clock Tuesday until the hour of the services. Randolph post, American [Legion will provide full military honors].
