DEATH OF A VETERAN.

General Patrick Henry Jones at Port Richmond, July 23.

General Patrick Henry Jones, a veteran of the civil war and wellknown to the old soldiers of western New York, died at his home, Port Richmond, L. I., on the 23d inst. When the war broke out Patrick H. Jones was a young lawyer residing at Ellicottville. He went to the front as an officer in the 154th regiment, an organization composed of Cattaraugus and Chautauqua volunteers. On the retirement of Colonel Rice, Major Jones was chosen colonel of the regiment. He was a gallant and able officer, devoted to the interests of his soldiers and was rewarded by their friendship and affection. His promotion to the command of a brigade in Sherman's army, with the rank of Brig. General was a matter of great satisfaction to the men who served under him, as well as to his large number of friends in western New York. When the war closed he settled in New York city and resumed the practice of law. He was elected clerk of the court of appeals on the Republican state ticket about 1865, and after serving his term was appointed postmaster of New York city. His wife, who survives him, is a sister of the late Mrs. Henderson, wife of Judge Henderson of Randolph.
