## EDWARD S. HULBURT

Is a son of David and Elizabeth Arnold Hulburt, born Dec. 15, 1839 in Bath, N. Y., and came to live in this county in 1856. He was employed as a clerk in a store at Princeton, Ind. when the thunders of Civil war awoke the Nation to its peril. He enlisted May 8, 1861 in Co. H, 17th Ind. V. I., in the famous Reynolds Div. which operated through Western Va. Among his battles we mention Great Briar, Shiloh, and many skirmishes in W. Virginia. He was confined in the Beverly hospital two days with a touch of typhoid fever, and was discharged in Dec., 1862 from the field, but re-enlisted Feb. 8, 1864, at Randolph, in Co. F, 1st N. Y. L. A. He was stationed at Ft. Tillinghast, Ft. Worth, and acted as clerk in Adj. Gen. office at Gen. DeRusse's headquarters, and was finally discharged June 5, 1865 at Elmira, N. Y. According to his official record he was a trusted soldier, always at his post of duty. Feb. 8, 1864, at Great Valley, N. Y., occurred a memorable wedding when our subject was married to Mary R. Lamb, daughter of Nelson and Julia A. (Green) Lamb. Four children were given to this union, Bessie b. Dec. 4, 1871, Fern b. Sept. 1, 1877, Merrit, b. May 2, 1885, and Susie b. May 11, 1886. Com. Hulburt is a faithful member of Sherwood Post, and resides in a pleasant home in West Salamanca, and is one of the esteemed citizens of his town.

## GEORGE HOGG

A native of Lyndon, N. Y. was born Mar. 2, 1839. His parents, George and Abigail (Reynolds) Hogg, have passed to their reward. He was a farmer when War's grim visage burst upon the horizon of our nation, and enlisted Aug., 1861 at Centerville, N. Y. in Co. C, 104th N. Y. V. I., Durca's Brig., McDowell's Div., 2d A. C. He bore active part in battles of 2d Bull Run, and skirmishing around Thoroughfare Gap. In Fall of 1862, near Winchester, he was sick with typhoid fever for two weeks, and sent to Portsmouth Grove for six weeks. Being rendered unfit for further service by his last sickness, he was discharged in Dec., 1862 at Portsmouth Grove, R. I. June 19, 1868 at Hume, N. Y., Private Hogg was happily united in marriage to Ellen A. Harris, daughter of Thomas and Mary (Taylor) Harris; she was born Sept 27, 1846 in Lyndon, N. Y. Two children have blessed their home, Alfred and Blanche. John, Benjamin F. and Adam Hogg, brothers, were in the service. Edward Harris, Mrs. Hogg's brother, died of the measles before starting for the front in hospital at Elmira, N. Y. Com. Hogg

is a member of the G. A. R., and wife is President of the W. R. C., and both are consistent members of U. P. church at their home in Franklinville, N. Y.

## RICHARD H. KERR

Is a son of Richard and Alice (Hannan) Kerr, and born Dec. 5, 1844 near Dublin, Ireland, and came to this country with his parents in 1850. He was engaged in farming near Machias, N. Y. when the thunders of Civil War awoke the echoing hills of the country. He was enrolled Aug. 20, 1862 as a private in Co. D, 154th N. Y. V. I., 2d Brig., 2d Div., 11th A. C., and in due time was promoted to corporal. He bore active part in some of the bloodiest battles of the war, Chancellorsville, Gettysburg, "Stick-in-the-Mud," Missionary Ridge, Chattanooga, Kenesaw Mt., Kingston, Resaca, and Peach Tree Creek. July 1, 1865 at Gettysburg he was wounded in the occipital region of the skull by a shell; confined in the general hospital at Gettysburg for two months, and from there he was afterwards sent to Alexandria for a week, and rejoined his command at Murfreesboro, Tenn. While in Lookout Valley he was slightly wounded in the right calf by a gunshot, taken to field hospital at Nashville, Tenn., and finally in the famous struggle at Peach Tree Creek he was wounded in first and second metatarsal bones of right foot and taken to hospital. In Feb., 1865 at Indianapolis, Ind. he was transferred to Co. A, 5th Vet. Reserve Corps and was guarding prisoners when the war closed. June 5, 1865 at Indianapolis he was given his honorable discharge. Dec. 19, 1876 at Bowling Green, Va. he was united in holy wedlock to Rena M. Fuller, daughter of Lafayette T. and Oliva A. (Kellogg) Fuller; she was born Dec. 30, 1856 at Humphrey, N. Y. Four children now honor their marriage, Guy, b. Aug. 10, 1877, Earle L. b. Nov. 10, 1879, Grace E. b. June 3, 1882, and Bessie G. b. Sept. 23, 1885. Com. Kerr was previously married to Francis A. Hopkins. Brother Hugh. (See record). Mrs. Kerr's uncle, P. M. Fuller, served as captain for years in the Civil war, an uncle Zoraster also a hero of the Civil war. Our comrade has ably filled the office of Highway Com., Assessor, and Excise Com. He is a member of the Maccabees and the honored Adj. of Phillips Post, G. A. R., No. 329. His wife is a consistent member of Christian church. They live on a well-kept farm near Machias, N. Y.

## CHARLES KENDALL.

Rufus and Sabra (Hubbard) Kendall were living in Genesee Co., N. Y. when a son was born to them Sept. 7, 1838. He was engaged as a farmer when the war began and enlisted Aug., 1862 at Stafford, N. Y.
