

JOHN LANGHANS, CIVIL WAR VETERAN, DIES

Was Corporal In Old 154th and Was On Famous March With Sherman To Sea. Town Assessor for 20 Years. Funeral Sunday At Plato And Largely Attended.

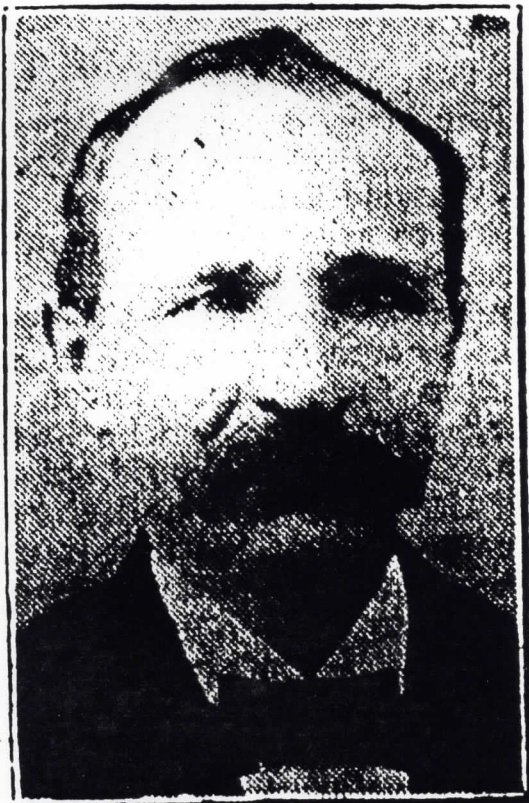
The funeral of John Langhans, Civil War veteran, who died at the family home on the Plato road, Thursday, September 19, 1929, was held Sunday, at 2 o'clock from the home of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Dunkleman and at 2:30 in St. Peter's Lutheran church, Plato. Rev. W. F. Malte, pastor, officiated. Interment took place in the family plot in Plato cemetery.

The pall bearers, all members of Wallace Bryant Post, American Legion of this village, were M. J. Cotter, William Blohm, William Hakes, William Fitzpatrick, Eric Sherman and Guy Milligan. The deceased was accorded full military honors with a firing squad from the Legion officiating. The following G. A. R. veterans attended the services also: Abe Maybee and Henry Hall of Ellicottville and J. Duane Fuller and Francis S. Smith of Springville. Vocal selections were rendered by the choir of the Otto Lutheran church.

Mr. John Langhans was born in Germany October 21, 1843, the son of Mr. Joseph and Dora Merow Langhans. He left Germany with his parents October 4th., 1857 and arrived at Otto, N. Y., January 20th., 1858. His parents worked for Mr. Lucius Lincoln in East Otto until the year 1861 when they moved on the farm where he lived until his death.

At the age of 20, he enlisted in Company H, 154th Regiment of New York and served until the close of the war. He was made corporal in his company and was with Sherman on his famous march.

October 21, 1868 he was married to Miss Sophia Block. Three children were born to this union. One daughter, Augusta Ranke died in 1899. Frank J. who lives on part of the homestead and Mrs. Emma Dunkleman with whom he resided. Mrs. Langhans died November 21st., 1907.

Mr. Langhans was one of the first members of the Lutheran church of Plato. Joining when the church was organized he was always a zealous worker for it. Holding offices in different organizations of the church he also was an assessor in the town of Ellicottville for a period of 20 years and clerk of his school district the past 30 years.

He leaves to mourn one son, one daughter, 13 grandchildren, 17 great grandchildren, one brother and a large circle of other relatives and friends.
