### Death of Harry Matteson.

Charles Harry Matteson died of con-  
sumption at Foxburg, Pa., on March  
7th, and was buried in the Episcopal  
cemetery on March 9th, 1900.

Harry Matteson, as he was best  
known in this vicinity, was born at  
Ellcottville, N. Y., Sept. 3rd, 1840,  
the son of Abram and Mary Matteson,  
and lived there until his removal to  
Foxburg, in 1875, at which place he  
has since made his home. He leaves  
a widow and one son, James Burt  
Matteson at Foxburg, and a sister,  
Mrs. Bethuel Moore at Brunswell,  
W. Va. He was a veteran of the civil  
war, enlisting as hospital steward in  
Co. 1, 154th N. Y. Vol. Infantry, in  
1862, and served until the close of the  
war, Jan. 1865.

He was a member of Ellcottville  
Lodge, F. & A. M., the Royal Arcan-  
num, G. A. R. Post, 249 of Foxburg,  
and the Union Veteran Legion Comp.  
at Butler, Pa.

That he was highly esteemed in the  
place where he spent the latter years  
of his life, the following tribute paid  
him by a citizen of Foxburg, whom I  
quote, will show: "He was a good son,  
a loving brother, and a devoted hus-  
band and father. This entire commu-  
nity will miss one of its most esteemed  
and progressive citizens. Generous to  
a fault, his heart and purse were al-  
ways open to the calls of charity, and  
no worthy person ever applied to him  
for help in vain." To this testimonial  
the friends of his youth can add. He  
is mourned by all who knew him.  
What more could be said of any man.
