Upon arrival at Bladensburg, Va., he was again taken to the hospital and spent three weeks from same cause, with irregular intervals; these attacks have occurred frequently since the time of receiving the injury, and as age advances they are more frequent, occurring once or twice a month, with consequent weakness and disability. Among the well fought fields on which he fought are Elys Ford, Va., near Culpeper, Shephardstown, Shephardstown Road three times, Gettysburg, Hartwood Church, Caledonia, Bristoe Station, Middleburg, Fairfax, Kelley's Ford, Sulphur Springs, Deep Bottom, White House Landing, Dumfries, Front of Petersburg, Front of Richmond, Stoney Creek, Weldon R. R. and Appomattox C. H. He was discharged June 15, 1865, at Lynchburg, Va. After the war was over our comrade took unto himself a wife at Harbor Creek, Pa. July 15, 1866, he married Miss Diantha M. Brown, who became the mother of four children, Florence, Ernest, Ersä and Burr. Comrade Mayhue is a member of Gen. H. L. Brown Post, No. 235, of Wattsburg, Pa., and resides on a farm at Lowville, appreciated as a good citizen—an honorable friend or foeman; his postoffice address is Wattsburg, Pa.

## HENRY MINA.

Henry Mina, the adopted son of John and Hannah (Mina) Ongana, was born in Alton, Holland, Aug. 25, 1846. Mr. Mina came to America in 1857, and was married to Miss Lydia Slatboom, at Sherman, N. Y., Jan. 6, 1866. Mrs. Mina was born in Wentuswick, Eterswitch, Holland, April 3, 1845; her parents, Garrett J. and Cenia (Hoytink) Slatboom, are no longer living. Four children are the pride and joy of this happy home, Jennie A., now Mrs. David Bransink; Sarah L., now Mrs. Lyman H. Stanton; Delia B., now Mrs. Henry J. Hanlink, and George W. Henry Mina, true to his newly adopted county, enlisted as a private in Co. G, 15th N. Y. V. Eng. and Pontoon Corps, 6th Brig., Gen. Benham commanding. Two brothers, John Mina and John A. Slatboom, also enlisted at this time and proved to be valuable soldiers; the latter was a member of Co. D, 112th N. Y. V. I., going out in 1861, and is now living at Clymer, N. Y. Private Henry Mina did faithful service in the battle of Petersburg, and during the war was specially detailed on picket duty near Petersburg. In July he was honorably discharged at Elmira, N. Y., and is now spending a quiet, peaceful life on his farm in Marks, Chautauqua Co., N. Y.

## PHILLIP MOREY.

The subject of this sketch was born in Lafayette, Onondago Co., N. Y., Aug. 19, 1832; his parents, Asa Morey and Asenith (Squires) Morey, have long been numbered with the dead. In the year of 1855, in the little

town of Fentonville was the scene of a happy marriage; it was here that Phillip Morey took for his life partner, Delitha A. Crandal, one of Ripley's talented young women. One child was born to these young people, Eva D. (Sheffield) who resides at Randolph, N. Y. She was born Nov. 26, 1862. A few years later the storm of the Civil war broke up this happy home, Mr. Morey exchanging the implements of the farm for the weapons of war, enlisted at Randolph, as a private in Co. H, 154th N. Y. V. I., Aug. 29, 1862. He was placed in the 11th A. C. and soon had the opportunity of showing his courage in the battle of Chancellorsville, after which he was doomed to the Regt. hospital, but his case needed the more effectual healing powers of home, and a short furlough became necessary. He left Philadelphia in September, only to return ten days later and be transferred to the 57th Co. Vet. Res. Corps. During the summer of 1864, Comrade Morey was detailed to act as Provost Guard from Point Lookout to Philadelphia. He was honorably discharged from the service Sept. 25, 1865, and is now a prosperous farmer living near Clark, N. Y. His grandfather, Ambrose Squires served in the Revolutionary war.

## JOHN W. MORRIS.

Smith Morris and his wife Polly (Williams) Morris, were the parents of John W., who was born July 23, 1839, in Spring twp., Crawford Co., Pa. He was enrolled at Meadville, Pa., as a private in Co. B, 56th Pa. V. I., Col. Samuel B. Dick, commanding, and was promoted to corporal and color bearer; belonged to Pa. State Militia, and was in company B, commanded by Capt. Samuel W. Roberts, of Rundell, Crawford Co., Pa., was mustered in, at Meadville, Pa., June 28, 1863, and mustered out Aug. 13, 1863, at Pittsburg, Pa. This regiment done duty in Western Va., in what was known as the Mountain Dept., Gen. B. F. Kelley, commanding; his entire service was guard and garrison duty; he was taken sick and being rendered unfit for further service, received his discharge Aug. 31, 1863, at Pittsburg, Pa. On resuming private life, he embarked in the mercantile business in Ripley, N. Y., and conducted it successfully until his death. Aug. 13, 1865, he was united in the holy bonds of matrimony to Sophia Palmer, a daughter of Alfred and Sophia (Osborne) Palmer. Mrs. Morris was born Sept. 3, 1842, in Ripley, N. Y. One child has graced their hearthstone, Effie A., (married June 23, 1892, to Rev. Robert G. Hildred.) Comrade Morris' grandfather was a veteran of the 1812 War, and both his maternal and paternal grandparents, men of Puritan stock, lived to the good old age of ninety, being married over fifty years. Mrs. Morris' great grandfather was killed in the Wyoming massacre. John W. Morris was the Supt. of the M. E. Sunday School at Ripley, for over twenty years.
