I do not believe that he will do the army any more good if they keep him, he thinks he has done his share of the fighting, he went into the army when he was quite young and it is not strange that he should get tired of it. I do not how far you may be from him, but I do wish you would go and see him again, and see the Surgeon of his Reg. and see if he will not discharge my son. ------, do them any more good he might as well come home as to stay there. You know of course more about his health than I do or could if I was there. I do not know but my continual teasing will weary you but I know that you are a father, and I believe you can imagine my anxiety for my son. Now Doctor if you can do anything for my son it will be gratefully remembered by me. Please write me after you see him. I rec'd your letter in due time.

Capt. Livingston returned here a few days after you left. He says he don't see how he can give you Transportation to the regt., that you will have to report to Annapolis, MD. at the convalescent camp. He is a strict confirmant of the red tape order and would probably rather not accommodate a person. I do not suppose you can do anything with him but will have to go to Washington to get your transportation or hunt your way through to the regt. without.

I had a pretty severe attack of hemmorage of the lungs
Sunday morning. I have been unwell for nearly a week.

--- morning I was put on duty as officer of the day which made

me down. Sunday morning I was down taking a bath

and as I was down in the water I coughed and found I was bleeding

suddenly. I got out of the tub and dressed with as little

effort as possible & after a few moments only raised a

mouthful as it would clot in my lung. I sent for Dr May

who gave me a preparation to stop the bleeding & I am today

(Tuesday) quite well though I do not go out of my 100m 100m

I was considerably frighten at first as it broke out much

more severly than ever before but probably owing to my

being in the water.

I rec'd a letter from Col. Jones a few days ago he was expecting to go on to the regt. in the course of last week in command of all the exchanged prisoners of the 11th & 12th Corps. He says " Carcarans (?) Legion " went west, also

two or three regular ----- the whole thing constituting about 25,000 men.

The 11th Corp accepts the change in their status without a single regret -

Knowing as we do that our new Commander in a military point of view is every way superior to Gen. Howard - In fact, as a "fighting" man to lead a single corp. in battle, I think "Old Joe" has no superior in the Army.

-Sad & pleasing association of nearly two years so cruely be away and the old "Es---" go down to rise no more!

April 15th

Our designation hereafter is - "2nd Brigade - 2nd Division, 20th Army corps. Gen. Geary (Gov. Geary of Kansas notoriety) commands our Division - I think we shall go back Bridgeport Ala. - where the rest of the Division is stationed- I think our badge will be a star.

Lookout Valley April 21, 1864

My Dearest Lis,

I wrote you two or three days ago that I was suffering from miasmiatic, periodic hemi-crania.— I am some better now than when I wrote, but I am terribly afflicted yet.

Every day about 9 o'clock A.M. a sharp pain commences above my right eye — through the eyeball and down my cheek to the teeth — and by 10 o'clock it is most excruciating — much more than the severest toothache — about noon it begins to ease away a little about my eye & side of the face and taking (?) the whole right side of my head and makes me almost crazy until 4 O'clock. Then, where it passes off entirely until the next day when it goes through the same interesting programe — The two days past it has not been quite as severe — I am in hopes it will pass away in three or four days.

It is entirely true that the money I have saved since here has been honestly earned - if a faithful, assiduos (?) discharge of duties - through toil and hunger & cold - & exile from family & home, can earn money honestly - and if to save money through the most rigid economy is right, I have the post satisfaction of knowing that I have the most absolute right to all that I have saved - Yet I told Woodruff what he said to you about that matter - I do not desire to act as if the money I had was acquired dishonestly - neither do I desire to advertise to every body the entire condition of my private, personal matters - It does not

concern the public in the least - and if we live "quiet and private lives" and pay for what we eat, drink, & wear I think it will be all right- I have been striving all my life to lay up a little means, yet I have not been able to do so until I came here - It is a fact that I have saved more & have more to show for my services for the past 19 months than for all the rest of my life !!! -- And if everybody knew it - mean MEXA spirits at home would bruit it about & say this, was a political war and the Republicans were coining money out of it -& would point to me as a leading Rep. in local matters & would ring the charges (or changes) on my past Success or want of success, and would say VanAernam made - of sourse they would swell the amt by \$3000 in less than 2 years ! You see the point ? - I think I shall be home before the half term expires of Dora's School - Yet should I not, and should you have to pay a little higher for her board, I think I would let her stay the whole term - With Love & Kisses for self & children

I feel as if no one can cave for him as well as myself. From what his friend wrote I think if he is obliged to remain in that southern climate his stay on earth will be short. If you can do anything for him you will confer a favor for which I shall be forever grateful.
