## JOE PUTNAM DIED TODAY

90 Year Old Civil War Veteran Answers Final "Taps." Ill But Two Weeks.

Joseph Putnam, Civil War Veteran, aged 90 years, died this morning at 5:45 at the home of his son, Arthur N. Putnam, Elizabeth street. Mr. Putnam had been enjoying good health until about two weeks when he was confined to the bed.

Mr. Putnam was born January 5th, 1841, in Humphrey. He enlisted in Co. H, 154th N. Y. Volunteers, September 24th, 1864, and was honorably discharged in July 1865. He was a member of the Henry Van Aernam G. A. R. Post, Ellicottville, up until the time the Post abandoned its charter here a few years ago. Only two other Civil War veterans now survive in Ellicottville, Abe Maybee and Henry Hall, Mr. Putnam being one of the three.

He is survived by one daughter Mrs. B. E. McKay, Ebensburg, Pa., three sons, Arthur N. Putnam, Ellicottville; Frank Putnam, Killbuck; Fred Putnam, Franklinville; by 11 grandchildren and 5 great grandchildren.

The funeral will be held Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the home of his son, Arthur Putnam, Elizabeth street. Rev. O. C. Epperson, pastor of the Presbyterian church will officiate. Wallace Bryant Post of the American Legion will have charge of the military service, followed by interment in the family plot in the Sugartown cemetery.
