

## REBELLION VETERAN DIES; 94 YEARS OLD

Gilbert Rogers, One of the Last Jay Old Soldiers, Died Tuesday

HAD HELD MANY OFFICES

One of Whiteside county's pioneers and a resident of Prophetstown since 1868, Gilbert Rogers passed away at the hospital Tuesday Morrison night.

Mr. Rogers was born Feb. 11, 1838, in New York state, where he grew to manhood. He enlisted Sept. 3, 1862 at Randolph, N. Y. in Co. H, 154th N. Y. Volunteer and served until the infantry close of the war, receiving his honorable discharge in June, 1865.

He attained the rank of sergeant and took part in the battles of Chancellorsville, Buzzard's Roost, and many minor engagements.

He was married August 9th, 1864, to Miss Cynthia Frary, and came to Illinois in 1867, settling in Portland township. His wife preceded him in death about twenty years ago. Two sons, Frank, of Shelley, Idaho, and M. C. Rogers, of Morrison survive him.

Mr. Rogers held many positions of trust during his long residence in Portland township, among them, Justice of the Peace, highway commissioner, and four years as county treas-

Mr. Rogers fell and fractured his hip March 20, and has since that time been at the Mormison hospital. Funeral services will be held Friday with prayer at the home of the son, M. C. Rogers, at Morrison, at two-thirty, followed by services at the Methodist church in this city at three o'clock.
