DEATH OF LIEUT. SAXTON.—Lieut. R. LEONARD SAXTON, of this village, a member of the 179th N. Y. Vols., was killed in the bloody assault on Petersburg, the 30th of July. He was in the front line of the assaulting forces, and, being wounded in the thigh, was being carried from the field when a minute ball struck him in the head killing him instantly. He was a brave and daring officer, and the intelligence of his death falls with crushing weight upon the hearts of his numerous relatives and friends in this village and vicinity. The deceased was 39 years of age, and leaves a wife and two children to mourn the loss of a devoted and affectionate husband and a kind and indulgent father. His body, we learn, fell into the hands of the Rebels, and was probably buried by them.

A HINSDALE DROVER MURDERED.—By a letter received by a gentleman of Franklinville from an acquaintance of his who resides in Ohio, the intelligence is imparted of the murder of Mr. GEORGE BROWN of Hinsdale. Mr. Brown left Hinsdale Monday, the 25th ult. for some place near Cleveland, after some cattle which he had purchased there some time before. The letter goes on to state that he arrived there and hired a man to assist him in getting the cattle, and they went into the field for that purpose. They not returning, search was instituted, when Mr. Brown was found in a wooded place, dead—his throat being cut, and his skull crushed in as if by a bludgeon—nothing could be found of the man who went with him, and it was supposed that after committing the foul deed he fled the country.
