# Died.

It becomes our sad office to chronicle the death of Addison Stone at the home of his son William, in Greenwood, Nebraska, Thursday, June 30. He was away on a visit in hopes that the change might benefit his health. He was ill for a long time, but it was not thought that the end was so near. He was of good old New York stock, and was born and for many years lived at Olean in that state. He was sixty-three years and ten months old. The body will be brought here for interment and the funeral will be this morning, July 2, at 10 o'clock, from St. Michael's church. Mr. Stone came here in the early seventies and has been identified with the growth of the city from the start. For many years he was a merchant and he also owned a fine farm a short distance south of the city. He was an old soldier, patriotic, wholesouled, and upright in all his dealings, and his example and conservative judgment have left their mark in the development of the city. His wife and four sons survive him. His sons are grown to manhood and are well educated, industrious young men, who are a credit to the community where they were raised. The ranks of the old soldiers are thinning fast, but the principles their sturdy characters represented still live, and among the men who lived up to and did his part in advancing them, the name of Addison Stone deserves honorable mention.
