CATTLE RUNNING AT L. There is, we believe, a statute enacted to prevent cattle from running but, through the neglect or inefficiency of the Trustees, the law, so far as this village is concerned, is permitted to remain a dead letter. Our streets are filled with cattle day and night to the infinite danger not only of life and limb, but to the property of life and limb. On Monday evening Mrs. P. V. SKINNER was run over by a cow on the sidewalk in front of the residence of Mrs. S. N. CLARKE, and so much injured she was carried home in an insensible condition. But, happily her injuries though severe are not of a serious character, and will soon recover. In view of this, which might easily have been done, we would call the attention of the Trustees to the necessity of enforcing the law above referred to. The cattle now on our streets are principally owned by those who are abundantly able to hire them, and if they insist upon using them in the square and the highway for that purpose, the authorities should be shut up and disposed of by the authorities.

ALMOST A FIRE!—About one o'clock on Tuesday morning last, the family of J. C. SHULTS, of this village, were awakened by hearing a sharp, cracking noise, opening the door of their bedroom, which communicated with the kitchen, Mr. SHULTS and his wife were met by a perfect sheet of fire with which the room was completely filled. By dint of hard labor and a plentiful supply of water, the fire was extinguished, and the amount of damage done, and the means of their escape ascertained. There was a place in the kitchen, in front of which a cook stove with the pipe entering the room some five or six feet above the floor. The fire place was closed, and the stove had not been used for some time. At five o'clock in the afternoon of the previous day, by some means the fire-board had been ignited on the side towards the chimney, the flames, breaking out in the kitchen, communicated with the mop-board, and pet, lounge and door. So intense the heat became before the fire was extinguished that the glass in the windows was broken, the paint on the wood-work was blistered, charred, and pictures on the walls were blown off and dropped from their fastenings. The escape of the house and family from the fire was absolutely marvelous.
