MILITIA EXEMPTIONS.—The question of allowing exemptions from taxation by reason of service in the State militia, is exciting considerable interest in various quarters. Assessors in some places make the allowance, and in other places they do not. Among those who have declined are the Assessors of Syracuse, and the matter is to be adjourned by the courts. On Thursday last, Justice Carter of the Supreme Court, in the Sixth District, granted an alternative mandamus commanding the Syracuse Assessors to allow military tax exemptions as provided by the law of 1862, or to show cause at a Special Term of the Supreme Court, to be held at Merkiner on the 22d inst., why they were not allowed.
