DEATH OF STARVATION.—We are pained to learn, says the *Olean Times*, of the death of DELACY WELCH, son of RICHARD WELCH, of Liberty, who died of starvation in Libby Prison, Richmond. This is indeed a severe blow to the bereaved parents, and one from which they cannot easily recover. He was a member of the 15th N. Y. Regiment, and was captured at the time a large portion of the regiment were taken prisoners. Thus it is that our soldiers are butchered slowly in death within the walls of the Rebels. The community will sympathize with the bereaved family.

Paragraph 5th revokes the authority heretofore delegated to Corps Commanders to grant furloughs and leaves of absence, except in the case of re-enlisted veterans; and with this exception, no leaves or furloughs are to be granted, save in extreme cases, until further orders.

Paragraph 6th requires corps and other independent commanders to send in a list showing the names and regiments of officers and men doing duty in their commands, who belong to regiments serving in other armies and departments. These lists must also show the circumstances under which said officers and men have been detained with this army.

Paragraph 7th requires that all officers and men doing duty in other corps than their own shall be returned to their regiments, unless exempt to general officers, and men on duty with batteries excepted.

INTERVIEW BETWEEN THE PRESIDENT AND GEORGE THOMPSON.—George Thompson had an interview with President Lincoln yesterday, which was satisfactory to both parties. In the course of conversation the President said, in reference to the Emancipation Proclamation, that the paramount idea of the Constitution was the preservation of the Republic, and that he had never for a moment doubted the right and the power of the Executive to issue such a proclamation, whenever it was manifest that, like a patient's dis-eased limb, "it" could be saved only by amputation.

Public opinion had advanced slowly but surely, and he had moved just as fast as it seemed to move, and he could move and be sustained. He could not have felt justified in the emancipation issue until all other means of restoring or preserving the Republic had failed, and he had no consciousness of having transcended his powers. "I do not see," said he, "how any man standing in my shoes could have done otherwise than I have done."—*Wash. Cor. N. Y. Tribune.*
