THE REPUBLICAN POLICY

George K. Morris, Republican state chairman, when he said that the Republican party must not only look forward but must go forward, voiced precisely what the rank and file are saying, and he reiterated it at the National Republican Club at the reception to the newly elected state officers and representatives in Congress from New York state. Chairman Morris said the party must adopt measures to meet the desires of the people and attract new voters who join one or the other of the dominant political parties every year.

The chairman said that what is done by the Republican majority in the legislature within the next few months would have immeasurable effect upon what is done in the state and nation in 1926 and 1928. There is no time like the present to do that which is to be done, delays, in the opinion of the chairman, being not only dangerous but in many instances deadly. Chairman Morris is opposed to procrastination and he told the elected officials that they should formulate plans for the future and that they should not defer in getting started. As to immediate responsibility, he said:

"The policy of the Republican party should be declared by proper legislative enactment and conveyed
