Big Attraction

At Fair Grounds on Saturday—200 Boys Send in Entries.

When the entries closed Monday night some 200 boys had sent in their names to take part in the Orleans County 3rd Annual Track and Field Meet to be held on the Fairgrounds this coming Saturday afternoon, June 9th, at 2 o'clock. With this large number of entries already in it assures the largest athletic event ever held in this part of the state.

There are ten regular events and a special tug-of-war between the Bethany Men's Bible Class of the Medina Methodist Church and the Howard Men's Bible Class of the M. E. Church. This is the first year that men have been asked to take part and they have gotten into it with a fine spirit. This event is going to be one of the keenest fought numbers on the program. In fact from the reports from the various teams entering, every boy is out to win and this means a real struggle in all classes.

Some twenty-five officials will be used, headed by Dr. Elson as referee; H. Dart Porter, starter, Edwin Phillips, clerk of course. Troop one and two Boy Scouts of Albion will assist these men. Tents will be provided for each team to dress in. There will also be a first aid tent completely equipped as well as a special tent for the manager. A trained nurse will have charge of the first aid tent and there will be an expert photographer on hand to snap the important scenes of the meet. A large score board is being made to be used in front of the grand-stand to keep everyone informed as to the standing of the teams, etc.

Nearly \$500.00 worth of prizes are to be given the winners in the form of loving cups, medals, ribbons, etc. These will be awarded at a big banquet at 6:45 after the meet. There will be music, speeches, cheers, etc. Everyone should go to this meet for it is to promote clean sports in the county and they will be given an afternoon of real thrills from start to finish.
