### A City Within a Building.

There are in the Ellicott Square building in Buffalo 40 stores, 10 counting rooms and 600 offices. It is estimated that there are 4,000 occupants in these various departments. The elevators carry on an average of 12,000 persons every day, and it is estimated that at least 20,000 enter the building between 7 o'clock in the morning and midnight. The population on each floor is about 300.

### Perfect Apples.

The apple crop of this section has been so damaged by insects that farmers have not been able to realize best prices and when a crop has sold at a given price for "number one" quality the farmer has found the bulk of his fruit rejected; so that the profit of this orchard has been small.

#### CAN THE CROP BE IMPROVED?

W. M. Orr, superintendent of the Department of Agriculture for Ontario says in his official report: "Last year we worked at 30 points, visited each station seven times. Only one solution was used, viz: Water, 40 gallons; fresh lime, 4 pounds; copper sulphate, 4 pounds; paris green, 4 ounces. We sprayed twice before the trees were in bloom. In estimating results part of every tree was picked clean and the fruit carefully examined; every specimen which had a worm or a spot, no matter how small, being rejected as imperfect. In the orchard of Mr. Hugh Black, Rochester, we had the following results: Snow, sprayed, 64 per cent. clean; unsprayed, 1 per cent. clean; Ben Davis, sprayed, 100 per cent. clean; unsprayed, 24 per cent. clean; Spv, 100 per cent. clean; unsprayed, 36 per cent. clean; Greening, sprayed, 88 per cent. clean; unsprayed, 24 per cent. clean. This orchard had never been sprayed before." Concerning this orchard Mr. Black writes: "The effects on the foliage was plainly noticeable all the season. The leaves were fresh and had the glossy appearance which indicates growth. The bark was smooth and looked like the bark of young trees, the moss and lichens disappearing, and the trees have made more wood than for several years past. The fruit on the sprayed trees was as nearly perfect as it was reasonable to look for. In my experience I never saw such results before on any orchard."
