St. Bonaventure University's Fr. Michael Calabria, O.F.M., will give a lecture on Islam and its practices at 5 p.m., Monday, Feb. 1. The lecture will be in Jamestown Community College's Magnano Reception Room on North Clinton Street in Olean.

This year's is "The Kite Runner," a story of two boys in Afghanistan, one of a prominent and wealthy family and one of a shunned ethnic minority, who become friends during the final days of the monarchy to the present.

Boot drive to raise money for Haiti

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St. Bonaventure University students will team up with area firefighters Friday morning for a boot drive to raise money for devastated Haiti.

Students and firefighters will be stationed at busy intersections in the Olean area from 7 until 10 a.m. Friday.

All the money raised will go toward Haitian relief efforts, including Food for the Poor, Hands on Direct Relief and the Carroll County Haiti Mission Project, said Dr. Todd Palmer, adviser for SBU's Students in Free Enterprise.

"St. Bonaventure has a history of working with local firefighters," Palmer said. "We raised \$45,000 during a boot drive after Hurricane Katrina."

The boot drive is co-sponsored at the university by SIFE, BonaResponds, University Ministries, and the Center for Community Engagement.

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Bonaventure -- HAITI -- Response

The massive earthquake that struck Haiti on Jan. 12 reduced much of the capital city of Port-au-Prince to rubble and killed an estimated 150,000 people.

St. Bonaventure University has joined the worldwide effort to help. Through the consolidated efforts of SBU offices and organizations, St. Bonaventure students and staff have organized collections for money, personal care items and other supplies desperately needed by the Haitian people.

Five First Responses

Ways in which the St. Bonaventure has helped or is planning to help the Haiti relief effort:

Collection for Food For The Poor organized by University Ministries, Sunday, Jan. 23.

Boot Drive, Friday, Jan. 29, 7-10 a.m. Students in Free Enterprise and local volunteer firefighters will be out in the community collecting cash donations. Ten volunteers are needed for each collection point. Additional sign holders are needed to raise awareness along the collection routes.

Collection drop site to be set up in Hopkins Hall.

50 Minutes Haiti. This multi-media educational piece is being developed to introduce the campus community to Haiti – the country, the people and the impact of the disaster. The purpose of the material is to provide a focused effort to help the campus community get a sense of the situation in Haiti. It will include a 10-minute reflection component. Project Coordinator is Larry

Sorokes, director of the Center for Community Engagement.

Direct Service: BonaResponds will explore opportunities for direct involvement in a variety of relief-related efforts. As health and safety concerns in Haiti are stabilized, and volunteer opportunities open, a service trip(s) to Haiti could be organized.

Title: Ways to get out of a ticket

Dr. Paula Scraba in the School of Education has had a chapter in the book "Service-Learning in Physical Education and Related Professions: A Global Perspective" published. The chapter, "Service-Learning in Physical Education and Activity: Blending Social Responsibility," was co-edited by Dr. Marybeth Miller, former chair of SBU's Department of Physical Education, and Jim Nendel. The publisher is Jones and Bartlett Publishers of Boston.

Read part of the Introduction:

... The perspective of this chapter for blending social responsibility and justice articulates the pedagogy of Dr. Paula Scraba, a physical educator and a Franciscan. Drawing on her work with indigenous peoples in Central and South America and various service trips with students from two Franciscan Universities, Dr. Scraba attempts to reconcile her theology with her practice as a physical educator. Dr. Scraba will provide a more contemporary theological framework, based on the teachings of St. Francis, that informs her critical pedagogy when teaching in the borderlands of Native America or in service projects with students in marginalized areas in the Midwest, Southwest and east Coast of the United States. This chapter is a call to service in the attitude of peace, on behalf of social justice, and with a deep and abiding respect for the integrity of all creation. The ervice programs involved physical educators engaged in University-sponsored service-learning programs integrating students across disciplines.

In addition, Scraba was named the 2009-2010 Professional of the Year in Higher Education by Global networking Cambridge Who's Who of executives, professionals and entrepreneurs. The selection was based upon personal achievements within the profession, exemplary leadership skills and personal commitment and dedication to altruistic endeavors to such programs as Special Olympics, international service programs and mentoring students in and outside the classroom.

Dr. Kimberly Young, professor of management sciences, published the article "Internet Addiction: Diagnosis and Treatment" in
the Journal of Contemporary Psychotherapy. The article reviews current models of diagnosing online problems and compulsive
disorders.

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
