



To Father Gerald McMinn, O.F.M., The Franciscan priest — The Bonaventure man — we humbly dedicate this book.





Contents

Through Education . .

RADITION prescribes that the final words of the Class of '53 be the first words in this issue of the *Bonadieu*. Necessity, of a kind, dictates that what we say now, as we round out and terminate four memorable years at Saint Bonaventure, be the implications of one word that describes, in part, the education which we have received here. The word is . . . discovery.

Discovery began for us four years ago. Actually, whether we realized it or not, our education had commenced when we first sighted Devereux, De la Roche, Butler Memorial. We discovered a room, met a roommate and fellow collegians, and sensed a friendly spirit, oddly familiar from the first moment we experienced it. We talked to men at table with us in the Dining Hall; we watched, admiringly, upper classmen greet each other in the quadrangle; we were awed by the fury of debate in the Cafeteria; we found two fellows from a town right near home in the registration lines. Possibly all these things contributed to our discovery that we were being guided and directed, some of us to Arts, some to Business, some to Science. That procedure seemed logical: it fell in with our rather vaguely defined plans and it gave us some sort of academic identity. We had practically reconciled ourselves to the classifications when we made a new discovery.

Let us describe it this way: all of us, irrespective of classification or of intention to prepare for special fields,

were brought together and introduced to subjects considered basic for the education of man. Logic, rhetoric, languages and literature, the sciences—social and physical, mathematics, history, philosophy and religion. We were reminded that the purpose of these disciplines was to liberate us from ignorance in all its forms, whether blind submission to faulty and unworthy authority; unquestionable acceptance of mere custom and convention; meek conformity to the opinion of the inexperienced and popular prejudice; or the natural temptation to hide one's ignorance with the parade of superficial wisdom. This, we discovered, was still as fine a purpose for education as it had been when Roger Bacon analyzed the causes of human error.

Our teachers, the Friars and their colleagues on the faculty, were dedicated to providing us with such an education. None of them denied the value and necessity of techniques, methods, procedures; all of them insisted, never the less, that these were subordinate to principles, attitudes, ideas. The duty of an educator, they felt, was as much to form as to inform. So, while we garnered the knowledge we needed to be competent accountants, physicians, chemists, lawyers, priests, teachers, and salesmen, we tried to reap some of the wisdom we needed to be good men, truly human and humane.

Thus it was that by one discovery after another our

education progressed from year to year. As we look back from the vantage point of Commencement, we discover that the process was not exclusively academic. Our association with the men of Bonaventure-classmates and fellow collegians, members of the faculty, Brothers of the monastery-played a part in educating us and broadening our horizons. Christian ethics in practice and Catholic belief in action complemented and confirmed the lessons of the classroom and the laboratory. Deeper consciousness of our own social duties and responsibilities grew upon us. We were members of a class, each with a duty of working heartily for the whole. We joined clubs and organizations, understanding that membership was a privilege and cooperation a duty. We discovered that giving-of ourselves -was of a higher and more enduring order than gettingfor ourselves.

In ways, the more impressive for being sacred, we were trained in the things of God. Retreats opened our eyes to the needs of our souls. Morning Mass, Night Prayers, and the Rosary drove home the lesson of Christian solidarity, Daily visits to the Blessed Sacrament, Communion, the Holy Hours deepened the conviction of Christian invincibility. If we were unacquainted, at the time, with the words, we had, surely, discovered the point of the remarks that "the real wisdom of God is Christ. We must first be Christians. We must read philosophical, poetical,




and historical works in such a manner that the Gospel of Christ shall ever find an echo in our hearts. Through it alone can we become wise and happy; without it the more we have learned, the more ignorant and unhappy we shall be. On the Gospel alone as upon the one immovable foundation can human diligence build all true learning."

Possibly our greatest, certainly our latest, discovery is that our education, marked out by a trial of discoveries that leads to this final stage of our journey, has occasioned a series of creations. We are aware that under the impact of what has happened to us here at Saint Bonaventure we have so strengthened principles upon which the present rests and the future will rise that our efforts can accurately be described as the creation within ourselves of a new order of justice, prudence, fortitude, temperance. New ideas have been generated, ideas of human dignity, human achievement, of human power to attain to the sublime despite the attraction of the sordid. They are copied, in one sense, from professors and from text books, from lectures and from discussions,—but accepted only because we had examined them and tested them before taking them for our purposes. They are creations in the sense that we have woven them into the fabric of our minds to the pattern of understanding, knowledge, and wisdom. We can, too, in a sense, take credit for the creation of new attitudes. Attitudes new to us, but as old as God Himself, whose attitudes, if we may so speak of Him, consist in loving Himself and in hating nothing that He has made. Our creativeness lies in this: that in imitation of Him and in obedience to His Son we have drawn out and elaborated into a way of life the implications of the love of God and the love of creatures for His sake. The problems of democracy, the challenge of international peace, the demand for honesty in politics and decency in personal life, the need for charity rather than unrestrained competitiveness in business, for holiness rather than ruthless materialism in society—in face of all these our attitude is shaped to specific usefulness by our conviction that faith and hope and love alone can save us.


Now, when our years at Saint Bonaventure have run their course, we discover—and we speak humbly, with a sense of tremendous responsibility to the future and of great gratitude to the past—that our education has had for its aim and purpose the creation of "the supernatural man, who thinks, judges, and acts, constantly and consistently, in accordance with right reason illumined by the supernatural light of the example and teachings of Christ."


The bedrock upon which is built the education of every student who enters Saint Bonaventure University is the School of Arts and Sciences. It is the foundation for other schools whose specific aims are to equip the student with the requirements for his particular vocation in life. The School of Arts and Sciences, which takes a general attitude toward the education of the student, provides the student with the background and cultural advance necessary to round out his education.

Even though modern needs and trends have direct repercussions upon university education, the Liberal Arts college has always followed in its academic structure the time tested "Seven Pillars of Wisdom" of ancient and medieval days, as set forth in the Hexameter: "Lingua, Tropus, Numerous, Tonus, Angulus, Astra."


The school has developed such divisions as are deemed necessary to fulfill its range and objectives. Saint Bonaventure University, in its School of Arts and Sciences, has taken Man as the main focus of all liberal, humanistic, and cultural studies. The University has developed its divisions as follows: Man and His Mind (Philosophy and Related Subjects); Man and Human Expression (Arts and Letters); Man and Nature (Natural Sciences and Mathematics).

Each one of the above divisions is further split up into Departments.

The Department is the more restricted and specialized unit. It is here, in the Department, that the student seeks his concentration, in addition to which he draws on the other departments outside his concentration for courses that will enable him to round out completely his education.

To serve as needed, might easily be the motto of the Franciscan Friars. Although they are primarily interested in man's spiritual life, they have always been realistic in their dealings with the necessity of his earning a livelihood, as can be seen in such items of Franciscan accomplishments as the initiation of the double-entry bookkeeping system (Pacioli of Tuscany in 1494), the discovery of oil in America, and the establishment of trade relations with the Indians (Fr. de la Roche in 1627), the introduction of "hock shops" as a protection against usury (the "Montes Pietatis" of the 15th century), and the "Paraguay Reductions" of the Franciscan missionaries to the South American Indians.

The Franciscans still feel the necessity of aiding the businessman. Saint Bonaventure College offered instruction in business machine operation and clerical work as early as 1900. Business Administration and Accounting Departments were founded in 1933, a major in Secretarial Science was added in 1938, and a Finance Department in 1949.

From an enrollment of 100 in 1942, the School has grown to one-third of the University's enrollment.

The Accounting Department, geared to the objectives of certification in public accountancy, is recognized by the New York Board of C.P.A. Examiners as having the educational qualifications to allow a graduate to become a candidate for the C.P.A. examinations. The Business Administration Department serves a dual purpose in that it trains the student in economics as well as in the auxiliary fields of management. Of all the departments in the School of Business Administration it gives the broadest background for the student of business. It is the purpose of the Finance Department to equip the student to deal with the financial aspects of business. As in its sister departments, its aim is Business leadership in the light of Christian principles.

Not a single day passes that we do not read about a new discovery in one of the Natural Sciences or in its related science, Mathematics. New cures, more accurate formulae for calculating natural phenomena, new systems of energy, or the production of a useful by-product, are but a few discoveries given to mankind by men working in Science. Recently, a former professor at St. Bonaventure, Rev. F. Sullivan, had been acclaimed for his authoritative work on spectroanalysis. Spectroanalysis is used extensively to study the composition of bodies.

This School exists especially for the technical applicative of immutable laws. Although the School of Natural Sciences has to provide the student with sufficient groundwork in fundamentals to enable him to pursue the more technical aspect of natural sciences, it has to provide the science student with enough of the liberal arts to give him a cultural background.

As a result, these Departments have struck a balance between the two fields, accentuating, as is fitting, that of the sciences. In well-equipped laboratories students are enabled to see for themselves the startling examples of natural processes and phenomena. As for the consequences, only human progress can testify. These Departments have provided the means to the betterment of mankind.

The Seniors

Dear Sam.

This is actually my first chance to write and say how disappointed I was at missing the reunion of the Class of '53. Ever since hearing from you last February I had been looking forward to seeing you and the old crowd, so many of whom I haven't seen since graduation. It must have been great when you all got together to resurrect old times and adventures! Not being able to join you, I took out our Bonadieu and looked through its pages to recall some of the high spots in the life of the Class of 1953.

One of the first pictures I spotted: me in a dink, being pestered by an over-sized sophomore whose name I can't recall. My strongest memory is that someone was always doing something to or for us during that first year. We arrived on campus on a Wednesday in September, 1949, and were greeted by upper classmen who managed to acquaint us with our surroundings and make us feel at home. From then on friars, profs, bursars, deans, librarians, everybody started making us feel that we belonged! It was only later, of course, that I found out that a sophomore's smile had a peculiar quality of anticipation about it! There is a picture of our crew taking rules! That, if I recall, was the last year that witnessed a fight for the dink on the greased pole. I do remember that we carried the day and won the dink, but all I recall about the hero is that he was a small, slight lad, and that he came from New York City. Who would ever believe that one could feel a thrill on the first trip down the center path?

That year of ours, I notice, was likewise the first year in office for Father Juvenal Lalor who undertook the task of filling the place of Father Thomas Plassmann who had given up the presidency to become Provincial Superior of the Friars. Of course, I think that we felt our "administration" was more important: Tom Supples, Ken Kavanaugh, Tom Waters, and Bob Lambert as our officers and Father Winfred McCarthy as the Moderator. That was the year, too, that plans for expansion were drawn up, work began on Christ the King Seminary, and the Building Fund Drive was inaugurated. It seems to me, now, that there was always something going on to knit a man more and more closely into what makes Bona's. It was a couple of sentences in the Bonadieu that reminded me of the quiet,



subtle ways our lives were being attracted to God. Our Communion Breakfast as a class was the first, I think, that I had ever attended. I can still picture the chapel as it used to look of an afternoon when I'd drop in for a visit after class—a soft, peaceful brightness about it that matched the Presence there. Do you recall the increase in visitors there when death came to any of us?

Go back and take a look at some of the terrific sports shots in the book, "The Fabulous Five" came from our class-Sassone, Kenville, Bednar, Edwards, Davies-and started to break all kinds of records even as a freshman team. Remember the day the announcement was made in the dining hall, after the noon meal, that they had managed to get us a bid to the N I T? Eddie Melvin only took care of the team-Gulhuly took care of the whole student body! Did anybody stay away from that week end? I was on that trip, and I made the repeat performance the next year—our junior—twice, in fact, once for the Saint John's Game and again for the second bid to the N I T. You were with me, I recall, on that trip to the Gardens in Pittsburgh when we played Duquesne, the contest sports writers dubbed the "Game of the Year," and the "Battle of the Unbeatens." Both teams had sixteen game winning streaks and were the only major unbeaten teams in the country. We came out on the short end of a sixty-nine to sixty-three score, but it was a great team, a great game, and a great trip. That's another memory of Bona's: win or lose, it was our team and we stuck behind them! I recall how that worked out in our senior year when the lads hit a streak of bad luck beginning in the Sugar Bowl in New Orleans. But things were as good as ever again for the excursion to New York for the Seton Hill game! I don't think any of the fellows in the class missed that one everybody knew it was his last chance to cheer a school team. Brother, that was a hassle!

Basketball meant more to us, I think, because it was during our time that football was dropped. Although we certainly had enough classmates on the field when Bona's was playing. Frank Godlewski, Romagnoli, Henderson, Supples—remember his speech in Buffalo's Civic Stadium? Meramble, Karlovitch, and Marchibroda; their first year, as I recall was Hugh Devore's last-it was in our sophomore year that Joe Back took over the coaching to astonish and delight us with the kind of football that exploited the full possibilities of Ted Marchibroda. We had two good seasons with Joe. It was too bad that the necessity of dropping football had eventually to crop up. Everybody hated to see it go. Everybody swore that there would be no way of filling in the gap in the list of activities —that was the reason, remember, that the Military Ball was given in the first semester when we were seniors.

Speaking of social activities, we seemed to do all right. There are enough pictures in the book, anyway, to remind me of Al Checci and that band of his that used to be popular at most of our dances. That last Military Ball we attended in 1952 was played by Jimmie Dennis and his boys from Rochester and for the Proms, of course, the lads outdid themselves in getting "name bands." When we were freshmen, it was Claude Thornhill and in our next year it was Charlie Spivak. Whenever I think of Proms, though, including the last one we went to in 1953, the best of them all was our Junior Prom! Frankie Carle did the honors. There are a couple of pictures in the Bonadieu that will bring your memories rushing back! The drive over to the airport to meet the girls, the rushing to the Golf Club or the Capital Hill before the prom, dinner, then the dance, the parties after—and in less time than it takes to tell the

evening was over and we couldn't figure out how the time had passed. What a week end it was!

Right near the Prom pictures, by the way, you will find shots of our thespians that are worth looking at. Every time that Father Regis Galvin sent out the call for talent some of our class were first in line to respond. Although we had some actors he never discovered! Richard II, Harmony Hall—who was the girl who walked off-stage and tumbled head over heels into the pit?-The Drunkard, Harvey, Grammercy Ghost,-it's hard to believe there were so many. And I still recall the Variety Shows that the NSA sponsored; even though they served a lot of corn at them they were more than good for a night's enjoyment and entertainment. Remember the night someone played Santa Claus with the sleigh from the Allegany antique dealers? And what about the night Guff's wagon ended up on the Library steps?

By the way, it was in our sophomore year that Bona's became a university and the occasion was celebrated with pomp and solemnity shortly after we got back to the Campus. It was my first glimpse, too, at Governor Tom Dewey, who had run for President just prior to that date. All the campus Republicans rushed up to shake hands, and the Bonaventure editors got the Governor to themselves for a personal interview. I recall how genial and gracious Archbishop Cicognani was; he was the Apostolic Delegate and he presided at the exercises. We felt very important explaining it all to the freshmen-in a somewhat condescending tone of voice! By the way, rules were ruined in our Sophomore year, remember? They got mixed up with Religion and as a result there was no dink fight? I forget just how the affair was finally settled, although I think we were distracted by the sudden death of Griff's horse-Charlie or Dick?-and his subsequent refusal to have any compromise with a truck. He got a new "high type" horse! Pete died that year, too, in the spring. The old brown and white dog that served as an unofficial

mascot and attended all functions, if only to scare away any other visiting canines? He used to look better than the freshmen at an ROTC drill. Someone said that he had a hundred and ten credits at the time of his disappearance. A lot of us staggered around feeling rather faint that day the Bloodmobile drove in and took over the campus. Remember the set-up in the gym? There was a sudden surge of patriotism when somebody discovered the pretty nurses who took charge of operations. One of them was quoted as saying that the only blue blood came from the sophomores-did we fall for that kind of malarky? Anyway, the officers-Ted Marchibroda, Mary Wagner, Mike Duffy, and Dan Mahoney-and our Moderator, Father Robert Frawley, received a great vote of thanks for our turn-out. Incidentally, Father Robert went to Japan after a year with us! There were quite a few departures in our four years, now that I recall. Father Aubert stepped out of the position of Dean of Discipline. Father Peter Carr went to the new Friary in Boston, as did Father Theophilus Mc-Nulty. Father Sebastian McKenna joined up with the Air Force as a chaplain, so did Father Giles Webster and Father Patrick Adams, only they went to the Navy, with Father Marcian Doyle who was our prefect in the freshman year. We must have been a jinx because one of his successors, Father Myles Glynn, took off for the mission fields of Brazil! Another one of our prefects went with him, Father Colin Shaffner. Could we have been that bad?

When we were juniors a tradition was started of inviting the children of the neighborhood in for a special Christmas Party with a gala Christmas dinner served afterwards. A lot of people I forget were in on the planning, but I do know that Don Stedman, Al Amendolara, Joe Legg, and Mike Duffy must have been in on it because the Bonadieu lists them as our junior officers, with Father Brian Lhota as our moderator. The following year, our senior year, we were hosts to sixty-five needy children. We sat in among them at dinner, trying to keep the kids eating instead of gazing around at every new sight and sound. Both parties were bang-up successes and the kids went home loaded with gifts and turkeys. I knew most of us realized how well off we were! Incidentally, Korea and the news of Bonamen at the front did a lot to keep us grateful for what God had given us. Speaking of that, in our junior year, Colonel James Kraft replaced Colonel Grayeb as commanding officer of the ROTC. He took over when we went to summer camp at the end of the year. Of course, we had to be different: our class went to Fort Sill in Oklahoma instead of Fort Bragg, North Carolina!

When we came back to school in the fall of 1952 we were pretty well aware that this was our last year at Bona's. Someone had started and amplified a rumor that the campus would be swarming with co-eds! Well, that was something nice in the way of a farewell gesture, we thought. And eight—count 'em, eight!—little ladies showed up! Two more young things tripped in as transfer students, but even they didn't swell the list to the proportions that had been expected. We felt that something had gone wrong with higher mathematics! But there was no miscalculations about assignments, term papers and the examination schedule—it came through with its everlasting aftermath of "lists" and letters home! Some of us made it-"They can't flunk a senior!"—but most of us missed the probation list and felt that the rest of the year would be clear sailing or easy going, to change the figure, with a light load!

That last year wasn't a bad one. We had some fine officers: Fran Henderson, Ralph LaPorta, Bill Edwards, and Jim Dwyer. Pete Fennell was President of the Student Senate-with Stedman, Duffy and Enright as our Senior Senators. We listed our candidates for the collegiate Who's Who: Alfred Amendolara, Patricia Cronin, Donald Denz, John Desmond, Michael Duffy, Peter Fennell, Francis Gilroy, Francis Henderson, Donald Hickey, Charles Iocca, Ralph LaPorta, Joseph Legg, Ted Marchibroda, John McMullen, Thomas Sharkey, Donald Stedman, Thomas Waters, Arthur Weber, and Conrad Tunney. Father Regis Galvin was the new Dean of men, but he and we were old friends and got along great. The Military Ball, the Christmas vacation—we had three weeks that year—Senior Privileges, the Prom, the Senior Dance, the Picnic—that last semester went too fast as far as I am concerned. Charlie Iocca and Al Amendolara began to haunt us: pictures, articles, ads, subscriptions for this Bonadieu. Of course, I am partial and prejudiced, Sam, but I think it's the best yearbook ever. At least, no one can deny that the men and the women whose history at Bona's it records and preserves—their activities, their surroundings, their friends, their achievements—will always have a place among my best and dearest memories.

Well, Sam, Ellie and the children are just getting back from a trip down to the beach. Good-bye leisure, good-bye memories, good-bye Bonadieu. Long live the Class of '53. God bless you, Sam, and all of us.

Student Senate

The task of the Student Senate, rather briefly, is to represent the interests of the student body before the university administration when policies affecting these interests are involved. Less spectacular, but equally important obligations keep the members of the Senate busy throughout the academic year: Frosh Rules, organizing pep rallies, sounding out student opinion, all are of direct bearing on the Senate.

The Student Activity Council is an inter-organizational group which concerns itself with the initiation and supervision of campus activities. Representatives from each club meet weekly to discuss plans for forthcoming events and iron out whatever difficulties might have come about as the result of past events.

The various campus organizations are religious, fraternal, administrative, scholastic or social in scope. The Third Order, the National Federation of Catholic College Students and the Cana Conference, the latter composed of married students and their wives, concern themselves with furthering spiritual life among the students. The National Students' Association has as its goal the strengthening of the student voice in national

and international affairs. The Women's Council, in addition to organizing the activities of the co-eds, sees to it that when it is needed in campus affairs the "woman's touch" is provided. The arts, business and science fraternities, together with the "105" Club, are dedicated to fostering fraternal spirit and projects. The district clubs, while basically social outlets, are instrumental in strengthening alumni chapters in the various locales which they represent. The different scholastic and athletic organizations give the student an opportunity to enjoy, as well as benefit from, the fields in which he is particularly interested. The Glee Club, Band and Dramatic Club, all of them successful in their endeavors, provide the interested student with a chance to realize his talents and, at the same time, offer entertainment to many. The three student publications are at once a depository for student opinion and literary and journalistic talent.

Because of their diversity, the campus organizations offer every student an opportunity to partake in college life and better himself spiritually, scholastically and socially.

The season's opener

Loose ball



The 1952–53 season was one of high hopes, deep disappointment, a rebirth of hope, and the final reconciliation to an unexpectedly mediocre season. In twenty-two contests the Brown Indians posted an even steven 11–11 mark. Pre-season predictions lofted the SBU quintet among the nation's leaders, but season results proved otherwise.

Fans had visions of another NIT year when Bona had an all-veteran starting five. Coach Melvin's "Big Five" was composed of Bill Kenville, Bob Sassone, Roger Davies, Mike Bednar, and Bill Edwards. These men were starting their fourth straight year together. In the first three years they had won 58 contests while dropping only 13. And at the end of the four-year period they had a 69–24 won and lost record. One thing these ball-players did was to protect the winning streak at home. They have not been beaten in the Olean Armory since the 1947–48 season. There is a 46-game streak now and it should prove interesting to see how long it will last.

In the opening game of the season against John Carroll, the Bona team rang up a 90–54 victory. The outcome was never in doubt as the Brown Indians took charge at the opening whistle. The 90 points established a record for the most points scored in a single game. Later in the season

this record was broken.

The second game against Westminster proved to be another easy victory for the Melvinmen as they won handily by a 68–44 score. Bill Kenville was high man with 24 markers.

Ithaca proved to be a thorn in the side of the Brown Indians as they gave them a rough time before they bowed out 59–54. Carlton Wood, the Ithaca coach and formerly at Bonnies, knew the patterns used by Melvin and he used them to really throw a scare into the fans in the local Armory.

Sparked by the brilliant shooting of Bill Kenville, Bona racked up its fourth straight victory by defeating a star-studded Quantico team 86–83. The contest had the sellout crowd of 2,600 in a continuous uproar. The lead changed hands 20 times and was tied 10 times. Bona came from behind a 48-42 halftime deficit to take the lead, 73-70 with



seven minutes left in the ball game. The tussle was deadlocked at 83 all with one minute left for the last time. Then Roger Davies dumped in a layup to clinch the game. "Clete" was high man for both teams as he threw in 29 points. All-Pro Paul Arizen was right behind with 28.

It was the fifth victory in a row as Bonas beat Siena College 65 to 46. Kenville was high again with 21. After this game, Bonas started to rise in the polls. Their first five games were played in the Olean Armory. Now the team was starting out to participate in the Sugar Bowl Tournament.

The Rebels showed little hospitality as they dumped SBU from the ranks of the unbeaten, from Sugar Bowl title contention, and from hard-won national recognition.

The other three teams showed no respect for Bonas lofty position as the only unbeaten entrant and pretourney by relegating the Bonnies to a convincing fourth-place finish.

Coach Eddie Melvin's club was repulsed first by the Billikens of St. Louis and then by the Villanova Wildcats.

Playing the part of the spoilers, the St. Louis Billikens knocked St. Bonaventure out of the unbeaten ranks by a 67–59 score. Bonaventure was picked by the experts to win by as much as 15 points. Kenville again won scoring honors with 20 points. The Bona team led in the first half, but ran out of steam in the second half.

In the consolation game Bona was matched with a powerful Villanova squad, loser to the eventful champion, Louisiana State, in a 100-94 overtime game. The game was a duplicate of the St. Louis game—a quick first half lead and a complete second half collapse. The score was 75 to 66 and the Bonas second straight defeat.

In game number eight, the Western Kentucky State Hilltoppers took over and showed southern supremacy over Eastern teams as they rocked Bonaventure by a 94-63. It was the worst defeat in the six years that Ed Melvin has been coaching Bonaventure teams.

Who has the ball?





In a non-scheduled game with Duquesne University, the Brown Indians were handed their fourth straight defeat by a 86-66 count. Except for the early seconds of the opening period the Dukes dominated the play with Ricketts and Johnson capturing the majority of the rebounds, the Brown Indians were unable to hoop the ball better than 25% of the time. Bonas All-American candidate Bill Kenville was limited to a field goal and three foul shots. Dick Ricketts was hotter than a firecracker as he dumped in a total of 32 points. Sassone and Davies were high for the Melvinmen with 18 points apiece. Mike Bednar was a consistent scorer with 16.

In the first Little Three game, Niagara's Purple Eagles came up with a brilliant third period to hand Bonas their fifth straight loss in a close game 51-46. Bonas team again ran out of steam in the third and fourth quarters. Not to take anything away from the Melvinmen, they fought back valiantly in the fourth quarter. They managed to cut. Niagara's 10 point lead to 4. Kenville again led the scorers with 16. In the way of statistics, Bona out-shot the Eagles 19-17 from the floor but Niagara counted 17 out of 25 while the Indians hit on only 8 of 16 tries from the free-throw line.

In the first game with the Golden Domers of Canisius, Bonaventure's Roger Davies sank a free throw with 14 seconds left in the overtime to give Bonas a 59-58 decision. It was a wild and wooly affair with each team trading basket for basket and putting the crowd in a frenzy. Kenville was his consistent self as he played another stellar game. The hero though was "One Shot Davies."

Returning back to Olean the Bonnies encountered Gannon the following day and handed them a 77 to 43 shellacking. This victory gives the Melvinmen a 7 and 5 record so far.

A game is not always won by the number of field goals made. It is sometimes won from the foul line. Such was the case of the Bona-Villanova game. Villanova was outshot 27 baskets to 23, and they won the contest from the foul line. The Main Liners put away 28 out of 47 free throws while Bonaventure registered 15 of 25. The final score read Villanova 74, Bonaventure 69. Bill Kenville, who turned in possibly the greatest game of his career, netted 19 points while Mike Bednar hit for 17. Late in the second quarter Billy Kenville put on a one man show as he fed Bednar for a deuce, he scored on a driving layup,



tapped in another field goal and stole the ball for another basket just as the half ended. But it was little Sam Glassmire and Jim Mooney who were the thorns in the Bonas side all evening.

In their next outing against Duquesne, Bonaventure looked like the team of the past as they walloped the Dukes to the tune of 70 to 58. The win gave rise to new hopes for an upset over Seton Hall because of the team's improved performance. Bill Edwards did a fine job in holding Dick Ricketts down to 2 field goals. Bona was ahead at the end of every quarter and with the exception of one time when the score was tied, they led throughout the game. Kenville was again high man with 20 markers.

Playing before the largest crowd of the New York basketball season, some 15,000 fans, Bonaventure gave unbeaten Seton Hall a rough evening before the Pirates spurted in the fourth quarter for a 74-67 triumph. Bonnies, outhustling the Pirates, led most of the way, although never by more than a few points. Shooting mostly from the inside they went out in front by four points 19-15 at the quarter. At the half it was all tied up. The lead changed hands many times during the torrid third quarter with Seton Hall leading 53-50 at the start of the ill fated fourth period. Seton Hall started to pull away in the fourth period and was never headed after that. Bill Edwards had four personals on him and couldn't guard Dukes too close. As a result Dukes scored nine of his 25 points in the final period. For Bonas Kenville had 18 followed by Bednar with 16 and Duffy with 14. Most of the New York papers had nothing but praise for the Bonnies in their loss to the nation's only undefeated team. For a break here or there it would have been a Bona victory.

Leaving New York, the Bonaventure team travelled to Albany where they beat Siena College in a real thriller 50-49. It marked the first win that a Brown Indian squad turned in a win on Siena's home court. Mike Bednar tapped in the winning basket with 50 seconds remaining in the game before 5,000 stunned fans, which enabled Bonas to do what was beginning to appear to be the impossible. Trailing by 6 points with three minutes left, Bonnies tallied seven points while holding their opponents to zero to eke out the decision. This win marked the ninth victory for the Brown Indians this season as compared to seven losses. Kenville again paced St. Bonaventure by contributing 15 points followed by Edwards and Bednar


with 11 and 10 respectively.

In a whistle happy, exceptionally rough basketball game, Coach Eddie Hickey's Billikens of St. Louis took advantage of their foul line opportunities to defeat St. Bonaventure 72-61. It was the second defeat hung on Bonnies this season by the Billikens. Bonaventure out scored the Billikens from the field 22 to 18 and boasted a 37.9 shooting percentage against a very low 25.7 for St. Louis. But it was the foul line that proved the outcome of the game. The Bills made good on 35 out of 60 attempts while Bonnies connected on 17 out of 34 charity tosses. Bill Kenville and Bill Edwards fouled out in the third canto and this hurt the Bonnies a great deal. Mike Bednar took scoring laurels for both teams as he hit for 24 points. Also Mal Duffy played a splendid floor game. With four minutes left to play Duffy and Bednar fouled out and the Bills pulled away to an 11 point victory.

Next the Bonnies traveled to Buffalo for their second game with the Purple Eagles of Niagara. In the first game between these two schools Niagara came up with a 51-46 victory. In the second game, Niagara clinched the Little Three Title and virtually assured themselves of an NIT bid as they defeated the Brown Indians 61-48. It was apparent that the disappearance of the four students had a tremendous mental effect on play of the Niagara players. The contest was close in the early minutes of the third quarter as Bona tied the Eagles at 34 all. Then it was 12 minutes before the Indians scored again from the floor. Bo Erias who seems to save his best play for the Melvinmen led Niagara's scoring with 16 points. "Clete" Kenville was again high man with 19 markers. An interesting sidelight is that in both games with Niagara the Indians failed to score 50 points which is an indication of the Eagles' stout defense.


"Clete" Kenville broke Ken Murray's field goal record in the Gannon game by cashing in on 10 field goals. That brings his total to 126, three more than Murray had in a full season. The score of this game was 75-59 in favor of Bonnies. It was Kenville and Bednar with 25 and 21 points respectively that lead the attack.

A scrappy Detroit team beat the Indians 84-70 but another record was broken by the amazing Kenville. "Clete" burned the nets with 28 points to boost his season's total so far to 362 points, nine more than Sassone's total for the 1951-52 season. Detroit had a very high percentage

in their shooting for the entire game.

Bill Kenville again shattered another record as the Indians trounced the Ithaca Bombers 91 to 62 in the final home game. Kenville scored 35 points in this contest to break Bill O'Brien's 31 set in the 1922-23 season. Also the 91 points was a new high by a Bonaventure team over an opponent.
