SENIOR CLASS HISTORY

I REMEMBER -

Oh! yes, I remember that wonderful lazy summer of 1951. I had just completed high school and believed the world was mine. Going to college in the fall was a necessary evil, but I would soon show those college hot-rods who was who, and what was what. September arrived and off I went to Saint Bonaventure.

From the beginning, I could feel my identity as a "one man show" slipping away. A Student Senator found me wandering bewilderedly around the campus, took pity and introduced me to the surroundings. The upperclassmen soon made me feel at home with their warm smiles and willing advice. I began to realize that I was part of a tradition-a great tradition-but, my place in it, I did not know. It wasn't long, however, before I found this position, for the Student Senate invited me and the three hundred members of the freshman class to the gym where Fr. Jerome explained to us the meaning of rules and then informed us that Freshmen rules had started. We, the class of 1955, duck-walked, sang the Brown and White and heard the familiar cry "You're Up!!". We saw Allen Hasselman "On the Road to Mandalay" with Ken Hanabergh following close behind. We were frosh and knew it. But rules were soon over and that first step on the center path felt great. The class of '55 had been born and I was a member of this strong unit.

In our youth we remember the powerful gridiron warriors, Hanifin, Marchibroda and company fighting their hearts out for our Alma Mater. We will always remember that '51 season and the thrills of intercollegiate competition. We had a young but aggressive club that year and Joe Bach guided them to a successful season. They were certainly ready for that terrific Louisville game which Walt Czaja won in the closing seconds with his long field goal. The Homecoming Day gave us Frosh a chance to prove our loyalty to the school and we rooted madly although a truly magnifi-cent Xavier team beat us. We united again as a class to clear a snow-capped field in order to allow our boys to trounce a strong Youngstown team 39-6. In football, the spirit of the school was exemplified in fast and furious action. However, unfortunately, for financial reasons, football, as a sport, succumbed in its off-season sleep and was not to be renewed during our days at Bona. We can never forget those who represented us on the field of glory and especially the frosh ball players, Vince Aungier, Bill Franks, Herb Kenny with those booming punts, Peter Klee and George McDonough. Each did his job that year, showing the hustle we were proud of and really would have displayed their ability had football continued as a major sport. Football had passed away but the spirit lingered on.

A fine team and an expanding basketball schedule helped take up the slack left by the loss of football. Bespectabled Bobby Sassone amazed us with his deception and speed, while Solinsky and Leo Corkery displayed a great amount of skill. That was truly a marvelous team and we followed them wherever they went. Remember that Big B-J weekend in New York? More than a thousand students participated in this weekend by selling chances for a free ride to the city. The proceeds of the sale fostered the transportation of our Spiritual Director, Fr. Robert Frawley to Japanese missionary work. It was a great weekend and everyone benefitted even Gilhouley's. After a great 19-5 season we accepted a bid to the N.I.T. Again we surprised the New York Sports writers with a splendid performance, finishing third in the major tournament. It was an inspiring season and thanks to Coach Eddie Melvin and the 1951-52 team, St. Bonaventure was a big name in basketball circles.

That year the Dramatics Club presented an outstanding production of "Gramercy's Ghost" and Ed Neilson and his "Footlight Follies" displayed the large amount of good theatrical talent we had on campus.

When Fr. Robert left for Japan he was succeeded as spiritual director by well-liked Fr. Evan Roche. Both of these men did much in uniting our class under God. Fr. Aubert, the Dean of Men, became ill, retired and was replaced by Fr. Regis Galvin. George Eschenbrenner was hurt in an auto accident and we faithfully formed a prayer vigil for him and soon welcomed him back to our ranks. These are the things we remember from our



frosh year, but there are also many more things to be recalled in our time at Bona.

We came face to face with the problem of electing our class officers and student senators and solved it very satisfactorily. Jim McShane was voted into the Presidency, Vice-Presidency went to Tom Vacci, Joe Carlon was elected Secretary and capable Jim Hillary became our Treasurer. Our Student Senators were able Ray Gawronski, Phil Mancuso and William Drummy. They served us well.

When we registered in our Sophomore year we were different men. Griff greeted us with "How's the Hi-Type Gang" and we knew what he meant. The Freshmen didn't seem as smart as last year's group and it was our job to wise them up. We were different men for now we had the power in rules and intended to use it. Yes, we had the power but the paddle had been taken from us and even the "BonaVenture" issued its proclamation against rules. There had also been a few changes in the faculty as our Frosh Religion teacher, Fr. Myles Glynn, left for Brazil and Col. Nichols took over the command of the R.O.T.C. detachment.

In the Fall we had our adopted football team, as the Pittsburgh Steelers professional squad used our campus as training headquarters. We also followed Ted Marchibroda's record-breaking year as he transferred to Detroit U. to carry on his career. Three former classmates of ours, Lee Riley, Stan Tubinis and Joe Belluso also shone brightly in Detroit grid history.

The New Christ the King Seminary was dedicated in November of 1952 when Apostolic Delegate, Most Reverend Ambito Cicognani and Bishop Joseph Burke visited our university. We will always remember this picturesque building which is one of the most outstanding structures in the area.

The basketball team composed of the "Big 5" Sassone, Kenville, Davies, Edwards and Bednar started the season off like a great national team should, winning its first five games. Then they tried to invade the Solid South and the Rebels showed little hospitality as we lost two games in the Sugar Bowl tournament and Western Kentucky handed us our third straight defeat. For the rest of the year we were an "in-and-out" ball club looking great one night and just fair the next. Again we took the excursion to New York where 15,000 fans saw us give top-ranked Seton Hall a great game before losing by seven points in the last quarter. From this team came another member of the all-time great basketball players as Bill "Clete" Kenville did a most consistent job of scoring and defensive work. Bill set a new scoring record of 419 points in this 1952-53 season.

We witnessed an expansion of the intramural program as a well-rounded schedule of events was formed for all to participate in. The "Greenhorns," our intramural basketball champions and also representatives of Western New York, brought new laurels to the school as it emerged victoriously from the State-wide Intramural tournament held at Cornell University. We certainly had the talent that year.

Our own Oscar Ruberti proved to be a pleasant surprise as he sang his way to the best individual performance award in the N.S.A. Variety Show. The Dramatics Club again presented a fine and amusing play as they performed in "Arsenic and Old Lace." The talent of Brother Ferdinand for decorating our campus came to be noticed more often. The Bona-Venture also improved its service by using its own printing shop on campus.

Then came the news that Eddie Melvin had been released as basketball coach and genial young Eddie Donovan appointed in his place. We missed Melvin's appearance but soon learned to respect and appreciate our fine new coach.

The year was completed by attending the annual Communion breakfast at which Sammy Urzetta, former national amateur golf champ, spoke and was appreciated.

Our all important Junior year began with very capable men at the helm of our class. Gene Black was elected President, Ron Koch, Vice-President, Dick Blake and Jim Hillery, Secretary and Treasurer, respectively. On the senate were three well-informed and ambitious men in Ray Gawronski, Phil Mancuso and Joe Carlon.

As I recall, we were all pretty interested in the conscription policy of our government and when General Bonner Fellers addressed the student body on the question, "Is Universal MILITARY Training Wise?", we turned out with appreciative ears. Those of us who didn't enter Advanced Corps R.O.T.C. turned out on Thursdays to snicker at the parading troops. We, who did go on in Reserve Officer Training can never forget our instructor that year, Captain Thomas E. Pfeiffer, U. S. Army. We always had a few laughs regardless of our state.

Radio station W.O.F.M. was resurrected from the scrap heap by hard work and many disappointments, but finally the joy of our station was felt by all. The Debate Team was of high caliber and enjoyed a banner year. We were proud of the accomplishments of these two groups.

In general the school year was progressing in wonderful fashion until after returning from the Thanksgiving vacation sudden death brought despair to our Alma Mater. A motivating force behind its rise to University status was lost when Reverend Vincent Devine, O.F.M., the Dean of the University, passed away. May he be looking down upon us today with his blessing!

Father Brian Duffy, O.F.M., was appointed as the new Dean and we came to know him as an associate with great administrative ability.

Confronted with one of the toughest basketball schedules in Bonaventure history, Mr. Donovan, coaching his first year of inter-collegiate competition, fielded a team that we could boast of. Early in the season they showed their strength as they lost a close one to a marvelous Western Kentucky team that ranked as one of the top teams in the nation. Later on Seton Hall

fell to the rampaging Bonamen 63-60, as we invaded the Garden in our annual visit to the big city. This was truly a fighting ball club that played each game as if it were the most important of the year. Mal Duffy furnished the spark for the squad as he hit the hoop for a 21.1 average in breaking the previous total scoring record of Bill Kenville's by scoring 445 points. Bob Schalk and Ed Madson drove hard as big "Sag" was always there waiting for that rebound.

The climax of all college days was reached on May 14 as Jerry Grey brought his "Band of Today" to Olean for our Junior Promenade. It was a glorious affair with beautiful dates, pleasurable music and plentiful laughs. Remember that Cocktail Party, the many post Prom affairs and the picnic at Allegany State Park the following day. That was truly a weekend to end all weekends. Bob Dannemiller and Hank Kearns did a very commendable job as Co-chairmen of the Prom Committee and they deserved our thanks. On Prom night we presented the "Outstanding Member of the Class of 1955 Award" to genial Raymond McLaughlin and he shyly accepted it with thanks.

We ended the year with a rally in Forness Stadium dedicated to our Blessed Mother Mary and went home for our last summer vacation.

As seniors we could fully appreciate St. Bonaventure in its true respect, as a Catholic University. Fr. Juvenal, the president of the school, initiated the academic year with his annual offering of the Mass for the students' benefit, and we all attended. Another semester, our last, had begun and studies soon occupied our time.

Our previous class officers had been so well appreciated that they were re-elected with ease for the duration of our senior year. Jim Adrian was elected to the Student Senate spot vacated when Ray Gawronski failed to run. Joe Carlon, as president of the Student Senate, did a remarkable job of making our campus a better place on which to live. To our class officers and student senators we owe our lasting respect, for they worked long and tedious hours for the class of '55 and S.B.U. In speaking of men of importance to our class we could never forget the name of our class moderator, Professor Peter G. Marron. His aid was invaluable and he instilled in us the will to represent our class and our school as best we could. We could never have gotten along without him.

The social calendar presented a well-rounded program in our senior year. The first Fall Festival was a huge success with its carnival spirit and a well planned dance. The "Jazz Sessions," featuring Dick Gilroy on the piano became the popular event on Sunday afternoons. Remember the "Military Ball" under the capable direction of Hank Kearns and George McDonough and its position as the highlight of the fall semester. "Mr. Interlocutor," Paddy Ryan, did a tremendous job as the histrionic talents of Bona were put to good use in an old fashioned "Minstrel Show." The jokes were the

customary corn but the talent of the men's chorus, Don O'Neil's rendition of "Old Man River" and the multitude of fine acts was greatly appreciated.

Our basketball team once again proved to be an asset to our university. We watched them roll to victory, lose the tough ones and nose out those close wins and we knew they were playing for us. We were proud of those who represented our class on the hardwood, and as they played their last game, we cheered them all, Schalk, Duffy, Black, Saglimben, and Kenny.

Beautiful Cardinal Falconio and Archbishop Robinson Halls were erected and opened to the students early in 1955. Their modern appearance and spacious and homey rooms replaced the barracks that had long served the institution so nobly. Bona had grown materially during our stay but it had also grown spiritually for it became a part of each one of us.

Easter time had once again arrived and our period as Catholic college students was growing short. That year our annual Easter retreat seemed more to instill in us an awareness of God for before long we were going to be a part of this business world. We had progressed a long way from that high school boy of 1951 for now we were young men taught in traditional learning to seek our vocation in life.

Coach Eddie Donovan's Brown Indians opened the 1954-55 campaign on a winning note when they easily disposed of the St. Vincent Bearcats 91-49, at the Olean Armory. This was Bonas 51st consecutive homecourt victory.

Using a fast break attack the Indians rolled to a 58-29 halftime advantage, which provided coach Donovan with a chance to test his reserve strength.

The 91 points tied the school single-game team record, which had been previously established against Ithaca.

Mal Duffy, Bona's brilliant guard, led both teams in scoring with 23 markers. Carl Saglimben and Bob Schalk contributed 16 and 15 points respectively. From the field Bonaventure shot a respectable 42% while St. Vincents sported a dismal 27%.

The Brown Indians played without the services of Gerry Schlee, 6-5 junior center from Buffalo. Schlee suffered from a wrist injury. St. Bona's 91 St. Vincent 49 Believing in the old proverb, "Records were made to be broken", the Brown Indians of St. Bonaventure set team and individual marks when they scalped Ithaca College 104-70 in their second Olean armory tilt. Mal Duffy, Bona's potential All-American broke his own individual scoring record when he connected on 15 of 25 field goal attempts and 7 charity tosses for 37 points.


The previous Bona team high was 91 set last year against Ithaca and equalled in the opening game of the year against St. Vincent's.

The Bonnies, after four tie scores and leading by five points went down by 15 points at half and could never close the gap.

Mal Duffy suffered his poorest evening of the young season as he was held to two field goals, but finished the night with 16 points as he tacked on 12 charity tosses. Bobby Schalk contributed 10 points in a losing cause, while Schlee had 12.

Coach Donovan's boys just couldn't find the range as they hit on 21 of 80 shots for 26%. The winners shot a cool 40%.

Villanova 80 St. Bona's 64 St. Bonaventure's Brown Indians knocked the top seeded team out of the running in the first round of the First Annual Queen City Tournament held by Canisius College, as they downed Chet Forte and crew from Columbia, 73-71.

It was a nip and tuck battle all the way and after 20 minutes of close checking, scrambling and good shooting when opportunities presented themselves, Columbia held a 35-32 lead.

Columbia started the second half off with a bang and racked up six straight points to take a commanding lead. But the Bonnies rallied to tie it at 57 all and pull away as George Evans hit a field goal, Jerry Schlee a tap, and Bob Schalk a set.

With three minutes to go Bona led 69-65 and accurate foul conversions by Jerry Olshefski and Mal Duffy quelled the visitors threats.

Bob Schalk came through to take scoring honors with 24 points while Mal Duffy was runnerup with 19.


High scoring Chet Forte was held to 12 points by Bobby Schalk. Bob Lehner hooped 17 for the losers.

Coach Donovan's charges shot a sizzling 45.9% while Georgetown had a respectable 35.8% average from the field.







Approximately two minutes earlier Duffy collapsed from a jolt to the face. It required a stich to close his cut lip.






Duffy continued his sensational shooting as he canned 17 points. Saglimben played one of the best games hitting for 17 tallies and rebounding well.





Forced to foul to get the ball, accurate foul shooting by the winners gave them their five point margin. Both teams scored 33 field goals.


Stokes left the game late in the contest as did Walt Milinski and Bona's Jerry Schlee. Stokes' final two points gave him 2000 points for 4 years.

Bona now sports a 9-7 record.



Both teams shot a respectable 41% from the floor.






St. Vincent's new field house was the site of Bonas 13th victory. The final score was 68-53 but there was one statistic that was even more vital to Bona fans than the final result.
