



SYR's, 200 days, MCMM weekend and the prom are all times that we want to last forever, but slip through our fingers before we have a chance to grasp them.


Unfortunately, no one can turn back time and replay our college years, but we can relive those moments with the help of words and pictures.






Even if you are lucky enough not to become a victim of your friends' evil intentions by attending the date auction and the dining hall during dared peformances.


The program's driving force, WSBU-FM, does its best to keep people informed of the event's happenings,

Spirits weren't hampered too much, though. There was still plenty of fun and entertainment for everyone.



It can sometimes be amusing. For a lot of us, it's the first time that some of our textbooks have even been opened.


For seven days, the library resembles a bustling airport, with everyone trying




A Time for Getting Involved. . .


Social and academic life can be timeconsuming, but most students still find time to participate in the many activities that St. Bonaventure offers.







Unfortunately, there are too many children, especially around the area, who don't have brothers or sisters to confide in. That's where BonaBuddies comes in.


A Campus Ministry program, BonaBuddies is an opportunity for St. Bonaventure students to brighten the life of a local child who needs an uplifting role model.

All one has to do is look around the dining hall to see how many St.



The celebration reached its conclusion on Saturday when over 400 students received their diplomas.


It's hard to believe that four years are over so quickly for the class of '94. Where did the time go? Wherever it went, it certainly went with a bang.


took the time during a Senior Week dinner to thank those who helped design their futures.



During our lives, we work so hard so that someday they look at us not just as their children, but also as people.





Showing outstanding leadership were the team's excellent co-captains, senior Susan Kennedy and junior Christine Barrett.


Fellow senior Dab Bochek also showed the enthusiasm and desire that was so prominent on this year's squad. Coach John

Conference.


"I think the season has shown that the program is going in the right direction," Waslelewski said.

As the lights were killed, the crowd responded by going into a frenzy. Players were mobbed by a throng of crazed students supporting the court kings.


Introductions were followed by team warm-ups as "Shout" boomed loud overhead, causing students to shake the bleachers to their breaking point.



Coach Jim Baron, all in all, had a successful season. He is sure to continue his winning ways, given the seasoned players still remaining and the new recruits coming in.


No matter who takes the court next year, the arena will still echo Harry and Garland.

They brought a style to the game, and to St. Bonaventure. They carried with them the team spirit, and never complained or retaliated to bad calls.



For years, they've competed for respectiability with the men's basketball team. Some fans have woke up and realized how good they really are. A division has already known.


The St. Bonaventure women's team has done it again. This time, they've done it with a new coach. They've showed the Atlantic 10 that they are a force to be reckoned with.

In fact, they almost garnered all possible points during the season. "The men lost only one point all season, winning 53 of 54 points," said Head Coach Pat Panzarella.



"Juliette and Tricia will be sorely missed by the team when they graduate in May," Panzarella said.


During the spring, the team will face tougher competition from the top Atlantic-10 schools, but, as in the past, they are sure to ruse to the occasion.
