





didn't matter.



haron Lund is an everyday woman with extraordinary heart.

In addition to her role as mother, daughter, and friend, she has become an AIDS activist. Lund came to St. Bonaventure University to share her story with both students and faculty on December 1, 1998, as a part of the University's World AIDS Week.

In her lecture. which took place in the Regina A.

Quick Center for the Arts. Ms. Lund shared her hope that by telling her story she can help to educate other and prevent others from being infected by the AIDS virus.

Those who attended the lecture gained knowledge and understanding of the

disease that has killed millions.

The work of AIDS educators and activists like Ms. Lund is beginning to have an affect, as thevirus fell from the top ten causes of death for the

first time in 1998.

Here at St. Bonaventure University students such as sophomore Paula Noga, who listened to Ms. Lund speak, felt that her lecture portrayed her story realistically, touching everyone who attended and making them aware of the changes in our world and in our communi-

ty. Sharon Lund is a woman of amazing courage strength, and perseverance, which are the forces at the heart of her message.


Dancing The Night Away




HAIL TO THE CHIEF

University President Robert J. Wickenheiser remained a powerful and influential force on campus despite injuries that kept him off campus for much of the spring semester.

The 1998-1999 academic year began well for University President Robert J. Wickenheiser and the members of the Board of Trustees, evidenced by high enrollment in the class of 2002. The fall semester went quite smoothly, with a few bumps, which were to be expected. The spring semester was also off to a great start, with the exciting announcement of extensive renovations to Robinson, Falconio, and Devereux halls, along with the addition of the three new apartment buildings. There were also high hopes for the school's athletic teams. However, for our president things were about to take a turn.

In February, as he was leaving Hopkins Hall one cold afternoon, President Wickenheiser lost his footing on the icy pavement and fell, breaking his leg badly. It was announced soon after that he would not be returning to the University until his leg was healed, but would continue to fulfill his duties from his home.

It became apparent that the President's injuries were worse than previously thought, and the University community was informed that Mr. Wickenheiser would not return to campus for the rest of the school year.

Learning from Afar

S t. Bonaventure University promotes the expansion of knowledge into different countries and cultures through their summer study abroad programs. A major part of the study abroad program is the Francis E. Kelley Oxford Program. Through an arrangement between the two institutions, a group of qualified and motivated students travel to Oxford University, in England, to study under Oxford dons. From the halls of Somerville College, the students explore British culture and take two courses with a British perspective, such as Contemporary British Literature, Shakespeare, and Irish History. The intensive classes are unique because of their focus on Britain and include a field trip relevant to the course.

The six-week program leaves plenty of time for personal travel to places such as France, Holland, Scotland, Ireland, and Germany, as well as seeing the sights of England as a group. The 1998 group visited such places as London, the Lake District, Warwick Castle and Blenheim Palace, as well as gaining a comfortable familiarity with the streets, stores, pubs, and people of the city of Oxford. "After a while, I didn't feel like a tourist anymore. It just felt like home, "said junior Sarah Ballard.

The students leave with a better knowledge of British culture, derived from their travels, teachers, and Oxford life, as well as

This belief will be remembered in the broadcast lab dedicated to him on the St. Bonaventure campus, and the high-quality journalists who develop their skills in that lab will be his legacy.

The new Bob Koop television laboratory sits in the back of the Murphy Professional Building and opened in the fall of 1998 as a part of the Russell J. Jandoli School of Journalism and Mass Communication. The portrait of Koop, who was a respected Buffalo television newsman, hangs in the front hall of the lab and will always remind students and visitors of the devotion and hard work it takes to succeed in journalism.



The first and foremost mission of the Koop Lab is to be a learning instrument for J/MC majors, yet its doors will be open for all students to experience.

The bright glow of the cameras in the newsroom is seen through a window behind the scenes for onlookers. Producers, directors and anchors conduct the magic, just as they would in any other television studio.

Students and faculty are thrilled that the Koop family gave a \$500,000 gift to start the lab. Despite the school's relatively small size, the family saw something special here at St. Bonaventure, just as thousands of alumni and current students have seen. Although Bob Koop attended Syracuse University, he had worked with the dean of the School of Journalism and Mass Communication, Lee Coppola, at Channel 4 in Buffalo for many years. He was also widely known and respected throughout all of western New York and his family wanted to have him memorialized in the place that he loved and the place where he was most successful in his career.

The ovation around campus is the same. "Everybody loves it and thinks it's great for the University," said Mary Beth Garvin, one of the new lab assistants and a part-time professor.

Dean Coppola believes that this is the best thing to ever




come to the University. "It shows that we can now compete with the bigger schools and still hold our own."

Reconstructed

Hall of Fame inaugurated

The St. Bonaventure University Hall of Fame has become the newest addition to the widely expanding Bonaventure community. The formal dedication took place on December 29 at the Reilly Center before the men's basketball game against Delaware State.

The Hall of Fame is located on the backside of campus. The theater like seating allows for spectators and guests to both view the plaques and trophies as well as the basketball court. The hall also includes a conference room, bar and large windows facing the outdoor playing fields behind the Reilly Center.

Dr. David Diles along with former Alumni Board members Kevin Ward and Rick Stevens were the masterminds who worked hard contributing their efforts to establish the hall. Previous Hall of Fame members came to partake in the dedication ceremony as well as to support the new athletes

being honored.

It was built because the university and the athletic department felt a need to recognize the achievement of the Division I athletes and coaches from St. Bonaventure. Also the previous Hall of Fame was not drawing the kind of attention and sponsorship that the university was looking to achieve.

Realizing that athletics are a major attraction, most enrolled students and prospective students view this new addition as beneficial to the university. Outside corporate sponsors donated the funds that were needed to construct the addition. Alumni and other Bonaventure community members were asked to participate in selecting inductees to the Hall of Fame. There were three categories. One category was former student athletes who graduated at least 10 years ago, demonstrated outstanding achievements in athletics and an undergraduate bachelor's degree. The second category was former coaches and administrators, that have retired, died or departed from the athletic department at least five years previously and contributed to the athletic program. The third category was honorary members. Candidates from every sport are considered with no set quotas set for each sport.

The Hall of Fame is a welcome addition to the more modern renovations being done to the ever-expanding Bonaventure campus.

Volleyball takes a dig

women's lacrosse steps up to D-I status



Only a few weeks after head coach John Wasielewski announced his resignation members of the women's volley ball team received letters that the volleyball program was being removed from its status as a Division I sport to be replaced by women's lacrosse. Wasielewski stated his reason for resignation was personal.

The letter received by the team stated the athletic department had discussed the removal of the women's volleyball program due to the lack of monetary support. The lack of support is in part due to the fact that the team members did not initiate any fund raisers. Adding to the reasons for the dismissal of the program was the inability of the team to attract sponsors to gain recognition and funds.

The team was receiving money for 11 scholarships (partial and full), road trips, uniforms and practice gear.

In response to being informed of the university's decision, underclassmen Tracy Bryniarski and Caroline Keenan agreed that they should have been informed of this possibility prior to accepting the university's offer for admission.

Sophomore Sarah Myers and freshman Kimber Ayers transferred to play elsewhere because of the university's action.

The university is allowing any remaining players to maintain their scholarship for their duration at St. Bonaventure. Of the remaining six on scholarship, two are seniors and the other four have chosen to stay at the university.

"It's hard to transfer to a different school and play a sport," Bryniarski said.


"I like St. Bonaventure and will stay here on my scholarship," Keenan added. The NCAA rule book states that the number of teams at a university must be equal for men and women, therefore, women's volleyball was replaced by women's lacrosse.

The possession of the volleyball locker room, and money for equipment and uniforms will be transferred to the women's lacrosse team.

"This is a great opportunity to compete at a level that most of them would never have had the chance to compete at," said sophomore Catherine Mellon. "They are looking forward to the challenge," she added. Team captains Maria Ceravolo and Monica Parikh agreed with Mellon.

After a coach is named, the lacrosse team will begin training as Division I. The lacrosse team is scheduledd to play its regular season in the spring of 1999 and next spring will compete against other Division I schools.





This year's Gold Bar Club officers were: Christian Peck, Judith Kszystyniak Emerling, Anna Cutting, and Katie Ferrari.



















Black Student Union

International Students




Formed in 1982, The International Students Association's main goal is to promote interaction between American and foreign students. They also promote multi-culturalism.

n the last two years, St. Bonaventure has acquired two new dance teams, started and run by students.




The St. Bonaventure University Dance

ourselves even better."



University Ministries

Programs that help St. Bonaventure students and the community

Every year, another wave of new students begins to make its way through the doors of the Thomas Merton Ministry Center. Most come with a simple need to meet new people. Many of this year's seniors, after first stepping into the center freshman year, continued to be active in the programs throughout all four years.

"I have seen men and women who are incredibly generous and have a real commitment to their faith," Sr. Kathy Dougherty, O.S.F., director of University Ministries, said of this year's senior class. Dougherty feels the class of 1999 has made a significant contribution to the state of the programs today.

These programs include the Warming House, the student-run soup kitchen in Olean; Bona Buddies; Search; Brush-up; and SBU for Life.

During the first week of her freshman year, Kelly Lysiak was feeling "homesick" when she first volunteered at the Warming House. "After going once, it became a regular routine. I started going all the time. It just feels like home," Lysiak said. She stayed very active at the Warming House, serving as a student coordinator and driver as well as participating in the Warming House Summer Internship Program twice. Lysiak, a sociology major, has also been involved in Bona Buddies and served as this year's president for SBU for Life.

"I hope what they have done here will carry over into whatever they do," said Dougherty.

Kirsten Herkert is planning on taking a year after graduation to volunteer at an inner city school in need of teachers. Herkert said she has gained a lot of things from University Ministries through her four years, including some of her best friends. In the process, she learned about herself. Through her four years, Herkert was involved at the Warming House, Brush-up, SBU for Life and Search, as well as spending a summer at Mt. Irenaeus through their summer internship program.

"I never limited myself to one program," Herkert said. "I've seen the whole realm of things available to us here (through University Ministries)."

"Our class has had some real groundbreakers who took on a lot of leadership roles," said Herkert.

She hopes that after she is gone other students will fill the leadership positions within the programs that members of her class have left behind. "There is a good group of underclassmen within the programs that have lots of opportunities to look at."

And more opportunities are on the horizon. This year the Friars Minor of Holy Name Province donated \$500,000 to the Franciscan Center for Social Concern, an optional for-credit program that would incorporate issues of service and advocacy into a student's major courses. With such a program, future students will be able to experience even more of the benefits that University Ministries programs have to offer.

Other trips that were available included evenings away, overnights, Inter-Collegiate Weekends away, Bona Community evenings away, and prayer and rest overnights.





Model United Nations




College Democrats




Dr. Nuttall was very proud of his team, which won 3 out of the 4 rounds at the National competition.




Danielle Burt enjoyed the celebration, saying, "It was a lot different from prom, where you could bring a date from another class. This night was only for seniors."
